## AMNESTY.

If no Caldwells were to be found in the Senate, there would be no room for Grant and his cohorts to oppress and slay the negroes. There is no room for them to do much good, but at any rate, if they are to do anything, it must be to do it in a more subtle and less obtrusive manner.
