GOVERNOR MOSES.

This disgrace to humanity has escaped indictment by the corrupt ruling of the Court. Judge Graham decided that Moses was not liable to indictment, but impeachment was the remedy. That is trying the devil by his own picked court, with a right to pick the jury. Moses is said to be guilty of lying, stealing and perjury. Under this radical Judge he may be guilty of arson and rape; yet he could not be indicted.

Our radical Judges hold this infamous doctrine when Gov. Holden held Judge Kerr and two hundred citizens in prison without accusation even. Sixteen of the State officials of South Carolina have been indicted. Six County Commissioners and one County Treasurer have been convicted and sentenced to the penitentiary. A Sheriff and five County Commissioners yet remain to be tried.

North Carolina was robbed of a much larger sum than South Carolina. In this State the robbers are at large, and with their ill gotten gains they run conservative as well as radical newspapers. When will rogues cease to be honored in the old North State?

**GOOD FOR BEECHER.**  
"Rev. Henry Ward Beecher said in his sermon on Sunday evening that whole communities are responsible for the criminals and defamers whom they produce. Thieving office-holders are generally pretty fair representatives of their average constituents. Tweed was sent to Blackwell's Island as a scapegoat, and the community congratulated itself on the triumph of justice, but the truth was 50,000 of his fellow citizens deserved to go there with him, in order that full justice might be done."

Just what we have been saying for seven years, and saying it in a sermon gives no more sanctity to it. When Gov. Holden was building up his railroad presidents, Dr. Sloan, Andrew Jones, General Littlefield and George W. Stearns, often said we should all be in the penitentiary, and Holden too for supporting, aiding and encouraging them in their robbery.

When Judge Dick appoints Billy Smith receiver, and pays him \$9,000 of the people's money for less than nine days work, after he knew that Billy had slipped Swanson out of town in the night time, and both taken and offered bribes in a moral court he became as criminal as Billy, and no longer fit to lecture upon "Women of the Bible."

When most of the Judges of the State recommended Windy Billy Henderson to President Grant for Receiver of the 6th District, they knew of his infamy, and that fourteen of the best men of his county had sworn in open court that they would not believe him on oath, they became no better than Billy.

Or that Beecher or some other man was here to preach a sermon from this text? "And it shall not be lawful for honest men to sit, countenance or encourage rogues."

The National "Republican," a radical organ, is hard upon John Pool and thus speaks of him:

"The ubiquitous Pool, the late John Pool, of North Carolina, the man who imagines that he is still alive, is a candidate for the position of Assistant Secretary of the Treasury. He is not any longer in his reputation so high, he is not in such a position to be elected in this separate section. And it is the first thing to know the few people in North Carolina who think that he is still alive, will in view of his numerous debts, begin to know that he has no influence here whatever. Pertinent to his application for the vacancy referred to above, was the remark of Secretary Bristow, yesterday. Said he, "I have many applicants, but none competent to fill the place of Assistant Secretary that I can trust." Of course the remark was made in a general way, without reference to any particular individual; but it is worth Mr. Pool's while to study it."

All's for John Pool. Grant's sword was not strong enough to hold him up. Pool is now suggested that prominent Democrats be arrested and out. We are not at all distressed to know that John is likely to be lost without being arrested. To see such men fall like year after year, but to bid adieu to the nation's honor is not to be lamented or regretted.

**JUDGE DICK AND THE CZAR.**  
The Czar of Russia banished his nephew, the Grand Duke Nicholai, to life in caissons, and deprived him of the Cross of St. George, which had been bestowed for his services in the Khiva campaign.

If Judge Dick had been Czar, and Billy Smith the Grand Duke, the Judge would probably have made him receiver of a railroad. We say this in view of what the Judge has done for Billy, when he knew that he had received a large amount of money in a way that he feared and refused to speak of, lest he might be indicted.

The majority of the Board of Directors will, no doubt, be astonished at the conduct of the Czar, for they, too, would imitate Judge Dick, in all probability.
