WELDON.—The following is from a Weldon correspondent who writes to the Petersburg Index:

The number of negroes that collected at this point, shortly after the announcement of their emancipation, is somewhat diminished, and it is to be hoped they are beginning to learn that freedom does not mean idleness, and that they will turn their attention to the means of obtaining an honest living for themselves and families. The corn crop is unusually fine in this section, and unless some disaster occur between this and gathering time, there will be no lack of bread in this community, and as corn is the principle agent in raising meat, we hope to have a sufficient quantity of that necessary article for another year.

Rather an unusual amount of sickness is prevailing. I have heard of numbers of cases of bilious, and chills and fevers are abundant. As a general thing, however, they readily yield to medical treatment, there having been comparatively few fatal cases. I have not heard as yet, any public announcement of candidates for the Convention in this county.

The annual meeting of the Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of North Carolina, appointed to be held on the second Wednesday in June last, but which was postponed, will be held on the second Wednesday in September, in Christ Church, Raleigh. The punctual attendance of the Clergy and Laity is earnestly requested, as business of importance will probably come before the Council.

SPECULATION.—The country is filled with the spirit of speculation. It is infectious, and all professions and occupations seem to be affected by it. Calculation is set at defiance. Business forecast is become a misleading phantom in the highways of trade. Whoever scents the carrier of swollen capital, as it is lifted to this place or that, finds the place of the eagles of plunder and predilection. To be "within the ring" is to know the rise or fall of stocks, or merchandise, floating like a bubble on the eddies of traffic. Excessive money has put into the hands of some the control, to a large extent, at their will, of the law of supply, and demand. By enormous purchases any article of daily consumption is withdrawn from the market, and an artificial demand is created. Then the floodgates of withheld supplies are opened, and holders release their grasp. The market next is glutted, prices grow unduly, yield to the avidity of buyers, then topple and fall. Some make others lose fortunes. Meantime prudent men limit their business operations, and there is a stagnation in that branch of trade. And this is the zigzag course of mercantile transactions now a-day, universally complained of, and almost as extensively practiced.

SUFFOLK.—A correspondent of the Petersburg Express, writing from Suffolk, Va., says:

"The clergy of Suffolk, all of whom left with the Confederate army in 1862, or soon thereafter, are returning. Rev. Mr. Wellons, of the Christian Church, has been at home for some time past, and Rev. Mr. Williams, Rector of the Episcopal Church, will soon resume his labors. The Methodist Church is supplied by Rev. A. R. Bernard, a venerable minister, living a few miles in the country. The Baptist Church having been used by the soldiers for a long time, is thereby rendered unfit for use until repaired."

The Chronicle, the Washington Chronicle speaking of the mendacious Raleigh correspondent of the Associated Press, at Raleigh, N. C., says:
