NEWS BY THE PAPERS.

Robert Officers in New York. We find the following paragraph in a New York letter to the Charleston Courier: "Sometimes the penniless Southern, turned drift in this great city, meets with the good Samaritan. A pleasing instance has come to my observation. Several of our South Carolina officers—among them a General—who had just been released from prison, were passing through New York, and were sojourning here for a few days, while awaiting transportation home. One day they were on a Fulton Ferry boat, when they were accosted by a gentleman who asked if they were Confederate officers, as their dress indicated. He gave them the card of a wealthy lady, living in a handsome mansion up town, with an invitation to visit. That evening to their surprise, carriages called at the hotel door for them. They were transported to the home of their lady friend; received with the greatest hospitality, and taken into a room where the finest and most costly clothing was stored, and from which they were entreated to fully replenish their wardrobes during their stay in New York. They were the recipients of the most generous attentions from the benefactress, and when they were ready to start their pockets were well lined with greenbacks. The good lady even went so far as to request the gentlemen to make out a list of such necessary articles as their wives might require, and she employed two days riding about in her carriage from shop to shop, filling the orders."

Prisoners at Fort Warren. A Boston paper says: Vice President Stevens, for the last ten days, has been released from close confinement, and is permitted to walk wherever he pleases in the fort, between reveille and retreat, and even ascend the ramparts. He is always unguarded, and seems to appreciate his relief from his dungeon. Another prisoner is Mr. Reagan, the late Confederate Postmaster General.

Jefferson Davis' Family En Route for Montreal. [From the Albany Journal, August 15.] Three children of Jefferson Davis arrived here this morning on the St. John, stopped at the DeLavan House for a few hours, and left on the Rensselaer and Saratoga railroad for Montreal. There were two sons and a daughter, younger than the names of the sons are J. Gordon and William. They were accompanied by the mother of Mrs. Davis, a white servant girl, and a maid servant. A large crowd was attracted to the DeLavan House.

Railroads and Crops in Florida. [From the Florida Union.] On Thursday of last week the first through train from Lake City arrived at Jacksonville. The benefits derived from the re-opening this route of 200 miles into the interior, are already manifest in the shipments of cotton, sugar, syrup and other products of the country which are daily arriving, and the shipments of goods of all descriptions which are daily being sent into the interior to exchange.

Mississippi State Convention. JACKSON, Miss., 15.—The State Convention, which met here on the 8th inst., is composed of many of the ablest men of the State. The following resolutions have been adopted: Resolved, That the President appoint a committee of fifteen to inquire and report to this Convention such alterations and amendments of the Constitution of this State as may be proper and expedient to restore the State to its constitutional relations to the Federal Government.

Alabama Railroads and Resources. The Huntsville Advocate learns from a Washington Dispatch that the Postmaster General has just ordered the renewal of the mail service on the Mobile and Ohio railroad, also to Columbus, Georgia, Macon and other important points. It says: There are three railroads, partially completed, intended to connect different sections of North and South Alabama, which will penetrate the heart of the coal, iron, marble, &c., region, and which may be completed at once—so soon as this is done North and South Alabama will be intimately connected—so much so that very locality and interest would be affected and benefited. The great mineral wealth of the State will be opened up to enterprise and capital, and the State itself soon become a perfect hive of industry and population.

Earthquakes. A telegram from Memphis, dated August 17, says: The shock of an earthquake was felt here this morning, shaking building and tumbling down chimneys, upsetting loose articles, &c. An iron safe in an establishment was also thrown over. The shock was even more plainly felt at Holly Springs, Miss. and Lagrange, Tenn. It lasted about ten seconds. No particulars of the damage done has been received. St. Louis, August 17th.—A slight shock of an earthquake was felt here this morning, also at Cairo. No damage done.
