But has the Governor ever said, as the edit it of the Progress declares, that there "is a good deal of bad feeling, and many persons not well affected towards the Government?" So far from same paragraph in which this assertion is made he admits that the "disaffection in the State is not sufficient to threaten harm." Why then does the aditor raise such a hue and cry about nothing ? He says "no harm is to be feared," and daily he prints windy articles on the "disaffection" of North Carolina.

The Progress savs: "But we have a class of men, editors, preachers, laymen, saints, sinners and devils who, the very oment publicity is given to anything like lawlessness and disaffection, assume their old self-righteous dignity and denounce men for telling the truth, just as they denounced all who were not ready to descend with them into the pit of secession in 1861."

Will the editor state who those "editiors, preachers, laymen, saints, sinners and devils are "... We know of but one man who is now an editor in Raleigh, who was a secessionist in 1861—that editor is Mr. Pennington himself. If he denies this fact, let him examine his tiles for that year, or the "Charcoal Sketches" recently published in the Record of this city. . .
