NEWS BY THE PAPERS.

Confiscation in Tennessee. The Memphis Argus, of a recent date, says: We are informed by citizens of Haywood county, Tennessee, that the United States Marshall has just labeled for confiscation the whole property, real and personal, of 45 or 50 gentlemen residing at and in the vicinity of Brownsville.

Exchanging the Sword for the Plough. A Richmond correspondent to a northern paper writes: Wm. H. F. Lee, son of Gen. Lee, who, after the surrender of the Confederate army, repaired to the White House, on York river, and engaged in agricultural pursuits, still remains at that place.

Speech by Montgomery Blair. Secretaries Seward and Stanton Assailed. A despatch dated Baltimore, August 27, gives the following:

Hon. Montgomery Blair made a speech at Clarkburg, Howard county, yesterday, defending the President's reconstruction policy, in the course of which he made some bitter attacks upon Secretary Seward, and Secretary Stanton, charging the former with having played for and against the Union before entering the cabinet of Mr. Lincoln, and afterwards, by his dalliance with the Confederates up to the fall of Fort Sumter, prolonged the agreement made with Jefferson Davis by order of Buchanan, before the termination of his administration.

It was by a coalition formed between Seward and Stanton, then in Buchanan's cabinet, that the latter became Secretary of War to Mr. Lincoln.

Mr. Blair charges that Stanton was originally in full sympathy with the rebel leaders in Congress, was most violent in his denunciation of any attempt to maintain the Union by force, and continued his denunciations till he entered Lincoln's cabinet.

Destructive Fire in Lynchburg. A fire occurred in Lynchburg on Thursday night, destroying the stores Nos. 62, 64, 66 and 68, Main Street, occupied respectively by Messrs. Neilson & Co., coal oil and variety dealers, Wm. H. Bose & Co., Salmon & J. D. and George Steptoe, grocers, and Commission Merchants. The buildings consumed were all three stories in height, with granite fronts. The loss in property of all kind, is estimated at \$100,000 to \$150,000. The buildings and the stocks of Messrs. Neilson and Bose were insured.

Probable Release of A. H. Stephens. WASHINGTON, Aug. 26.—The President will probably order the release of Alexander H. Stephens. His case has been under consideration for some time, and has been again urged by his brother, Linton Stephens, who has had several interviews with Mr. Johnson.

The ex-rebel Governor Brown of Georgia, is here on important business connected with the re-organization of his State. He is in thorough sympathy with the policy of the President.

The proclamation permitting paroled prisoners to leave the country is regarded as a significant indication of policy.

It has been issued in response to the application of a number of ex-Confederate civil and military officers.

General Lee will avail himself of its provisions to leave the country.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 27.—Robert Ould, ex-rebel commissioner for the exchange of prisoners, was among the visitors to the President's house yesterday.

WASHINGTON, August 25th.—Ex Congressman George H. Yeaman, of Kentucky, has been appointed Minister to Denmark.

Removed Heavy Defalcation.—The Boston Express says that a defalcation of \$64,000 in the accounts of a book-keeper in a prominent wholesale establishment in that city has been discovered. It is stated that his salary was \$1,500 per annum, and that he owns a house at the South End which, with his furniture, his employees have attached.

Chicago, Aug. 26.—A San Francisco telegram of the 23d instant, says the following vessels have been destroyed by the pirate Shenandoah: Horatia, J. Howard, Nassau, Brunswick, James Mandy, Waverly, Martha and Congress, all of New Bedford.
