NEWS BY THE PAPERS.

Rebellion in Hayti.

Interesting West India news was brought to us by the steamer Columbia, which arrived here yesterday, from Havana on the 26th inst. The republic of Domingo, even before it has got rid of its Spanish invaders, has again become involved in domestic difficulties. The capital and other principal towns have declared against General Pimental, who since January last has assumed to be at the head of governmental affairs, and General Cabral has been chosen Protector of the republic. It is charged that Pimental has been acting in complete defiance of law and consulting only his own will. Cabral has accepted the office imposed on him, formed a government, placed himself at the head of a body of troops to put down his opponents, issued a proclamation, and written a conciliatory letter to Pimental, in which the latter is adjured to sacrifice his ambitious projects and submit to the will of the people. Nothing later is furnished by this arrival regarding the movements or intentions of the Spaniards in St. Domingo.

Advice regarding the progress of the rebellion in the republic of Hayti are to the 23d instant, and are decidedly favorable to the revolutionists, who had taken Fort St. Michael, opposite the town of Cape Haytien, thus compelling a cessation of the bombardment of the latter and the evacuation of Petite Anse by the forces of President Geffard. Atrocities by the rebels in Cape Haytien are reported, and it is said that white persons were threatened with death if they appeared on the streets.

The Cubans have lately received fresh shocks of American enterprise and electricity. Petroleum having been discovered in the island, a company to proceed with boring operations has been formed in Havana, and an association to lay a submarine cable from the town of Porto Rico to this country has also been organized. The ex-rebel ram Stonewall and the ex-rebel General Kirby Smith still remain in Cuba—the former at Havana, and the latter on the plantation of a friend near Matanzas. It is concluded that General Dulce, the Captain General, will not be superseded for at least some time yet.—New York Herald.

The Provisional Governors.

In view of facts which have already been elicited, a statement has been circulated that the Southern Provisional Governors have favored original secessionists in appointments to office and in recommendation for positions, thus entirely ignoring the claims of Union men. So far from this being true, it is ascertained that the Provisional Governors are now acting according to the policy indicated by the Executive authority, and are therefore pursuing such a course as will best comport with the loyal sentiment of the country. Original Union men will not be ignored or overlooked as agents in the great work of pacification, and whatever errors may have been committed in this respect will doubtless soon be remedied.

Reconstruction in Alabama.

A gentleman recently occupying a prominent position, who arrived here to day from Alabama, says that provost marshals have been appointed in every county of the State to administer the oath of amnesty; that the people everywhere, with comparatively few exceptions, express much anxiety to take it; that the election will doubtless pass off quietly and with satisfaction to the loyal people; and that the best possible feeling exists between Governor Parsons and the military authorities. He mentions as an observable fact that the men who were recently in arms are now most in favor of the government, while some of those who were too cowardly to take part in the war are still the most blatant against it.—Washington Correspondence.

The State Convention of Mississippi.

The principal subject of conversation here, aside from cotton, is connected with the proceedings of the State Convention, now in session at Jackson. Until the permanent organization of the Convention, Hon. Wm. L. Sharkey, Provisional Governor of the State, acted as President pro tem.

Hon. J. S. Jarger, who was selected to the responsible position of President of the Convention, delivered a short address on assuming his office. He hoped, he said, this would be an era of restoration, peace and prosperity, and security to the generations to come after us. He trusted that the time would never again come when the freemen of this land will be compelled to bend to military rule and despotic sway. Until Mississippi avails herself of the means of restoration now within her grasp, she and her people will be the most abject slaves. It was within the power of the delegates to inaugurate a day and a policy that will cause future generations to bless them. He invoked them to cultivate a generous harmony and intercourse, and expressed the belief that as long as the world would witness the spectacle of a republic united in purpose from the Atlantic to the Pacific—from the Gulf to the extreme States of the North.—Washington Correspondence.
