NEWS BY THE PAPERS. MEETING OF THE GRAND LODGE OF ODD FELLOWS. THE SOUTHERN STATES TO BE REPRESENTED.

It will be recalled that shortly after the close of the war, the Grand Sir of the Grand Lodge of the United States, Isaac M. Vitch, Esq., issued a proclamation in which he invited the Grand Lodges belonging to the late Confederate Government to send delegates to the Grand Lodge of the United States, which assembled in Baltimore on the 18th of September.

It is a pleasant duty to record the fact that the Grand Secretary has received favorable responses from nearly every Grand Lodge in the United States, and it is now confidently believed that at the coming meeting the order will once again present an unbroken front, and that one of the old time gatherings will take place.

Extraordinary Decision of a Negro Meeting. The Mobile Advertiser, of the 16th ultimo, makes the following extraordinary announcement on the authority of a citizen who was present at a meeting of negroes on the previous Sunday, near that city:

"Five hundred of them assembled to consider their condition, their rights and duties under the new state of existence—upon which they have so suddenly launched. Our informant was surprised at the hard, practical sense and moderation of tone with which the spokesmen of the meeting urged their views. After a long talk and careful deliberation, this meeting resolved, by a vote of seven hundred voices to a hundred, that they had made a practical trial for three months of the freedom which the war has bequeathed to them; that its realities were far from being so flattering to them as their imaginations had painted it; that they had discovered that the prejudices of color were by no means confined to the people of the South, but on the contrary, that it was stronger and more marked against them in the strangers from the North than in the home people of the South, among whom they had been reared; that negroes, no more than white men could live without work, or be comfortable without homes; that their Northern deliverers from bondage had not, as they had expected, and been taught to expect, undertaken to provide for their happy existence in their new state of freedom, and that their old masters had ceased to take any interest in them or have a care for them; and finally, that their 'last state was worse than the first,' and it was their deliberate conclusion that their true happiness and well-being required them to return to the homes which they had abandoned in a moment of excitement, and go to work again under their old masters. And so the resolutions were passed, and at last accounts the wanderers were packing up their little stock of movable goods, preparatory to the execution of their sensible purpose."

Mr. Davis. A Fortress Monroe letter of the 31st ult., says: Jeff. Davis again appeared on the ramparts of the Fortress last evening. His carbunch has got so far well as no longer to impede his walking.

Guerrilla Outrages. The Louisville Journal, Aug. 29, says: Saturday evening last a party of guerrillas, eight in number, made their appearance at Choctaw Bend, on the Mississippi river, at the house of Mr. Harrison, whom they took from his house in presence of his family, and tying him up, robbed him of \$1,400, after which they decamped, crossing the river to Cypress Bend. Here they entered the house of Mr. Wade, a planter, reading hard by, and robbing him of \$600, disappeared in the direction of the interior, where they committed other similar depredations upon defenceless inhabitants.
