NEWS BY THE PAPERS.

The Mexican Question said to have been discussed in Cabinet Meeting... A Scene between Seward and Harlan... Juarez not to be supported, &c.

The Mexican question was discussed at the Cabinet meeting held on Tuesday, and which was presided over by President Johnson. All the members present expressed themselves favorable to the status quo except Mr. Harlan, Secretary of the Interior, who desired that Juarez should at least be indirectly supported.

Mr. Johnson, when the meeting was about breaking up, said that he would not determine upon a final policy toward Mexico before the meeting of Congress, when he would discuss in his message whatever might seem best for the country.

An Emigration of Capital to this Country--Vast Movement of English Enterprise and Money.

The migration of the industrial development of human energy--of that composite power made up of capital, skill, ingenuity, and an enterprise--furnish one of the most remarkable points in the history of nations. Even in the ancient days, when the world was so infinitely less realistic and practical than it is now, these migrations exercised a wonderful influence, and the movements of capital and labor determined the glory or decay of cities, principalities and powers.

We are about to see a very extensive movement of this class--one different in its nature and in its causes from any that have preceded it in the world's history, and likely to be vastly more important in its results. A party of English gentlemen landed in this city the other day, whose visit to our shores, we believe, will prove to be of more significance in the history of our country than the visit of any other single party of Europeans we have ever seen.

This is the first step of a grand migration of capital and enterprise from Europe to this country. Hitherto we have had an immense emigration of the mere humanity of Europe. Its oppressed and impoverished children have come to this country by hundreds of thousands in the bare wish to better their physical condition, and they have looked to our shores readily at the first dawn of promise, because in the human breast the hope of success is always stronger than the fear of failure.
