Megro Soldiers Hung in Texas for an Outrage Committed Near this City.

The following official statement of just punishment visited upon the perpetrators of a diabolical outrage committed in this vicinity, was received at this office yesterday :

ASSISTANT INSPECTOR GENERAL'S OFFICE,) Head'qra 3d Division, 25th Army Corps, Brazos Santiago, Texas, Aug. 20, 1865.

Editor of the Richmond Times - Sir : Some of the inhabitants of Richmond or vicinity may re-collect that white a portion of the Twenty-fifth Army Corps was encamped at the outskirts of the city, an outrage was committed by colored soldiers upon one Mrs. Eliza Woodson and her neice, (whose name I have forgotten,) who resided on the Deep Run road about a half a mile out Three soldiers, Sergeants Jackson and Brooks,

and Corporal John Sheppard, all belong to the Thirty-eighth Regiment United States Colored Troops, were tried by a General Court Martial as the perpetrators of this outrage - were convicted, and sentenced to be hanged,

Sergeants Jackson and Brooks suffered the death penalty at Brownsville Texas, on the 29th day of July, 1865, in the presence of the entire

Corporal Sheppard, the third party, was injured on board of a transport while lying in Humpton Roads, by having his collar-bone broken, and was sent to the Fortress Mouroe hospital. This accident has only delayed his panishment. He will undonbtedly meet his just deserts.

THADDEUS STEVENS RAMPANT.

The President's Policy Denounced.

The Hon. Thaddeus Stevens delivered a speech in the court house, in Lameaster, Pa, on Wednesday night, which was a tissue of sophistical fallacies, in direct opposition to the policy of President Johnson. He denounces the theory that the revolted States have never been out of the Union asan "utter absurdity," and the attempt of the Executive to direct Conventions to be held for remodeling the Constitutions of such States as "rank usurpation." He regards President Johnson's theory of restoration as wholly wrong, and would have the Southern States held as conquered provinces. He declared himself to be in favor of confiscating the property of all Southerners worth over \$10,000, who had in any manner committed themselves to the procedution of the war. He estimates that this property would produce a sum of ever three thousand millions of dollars, which, he proposes, should be used to compensate loyal men who lost property in the war, to provide houses for negroes, to increase the pensions of soldiers, and towards liquidating the public debt. He stated that this, though usually estimated at four billions of dollars, is far beyond that amount, and that the annual expenditure will shortly be not less than five hundred millions of dollars. In concluding his address, he "boldly avowed his belief that the very existence of the Republican party depended upon the Rebel States being kept out of the Upion for a while; their admission- would render the success of the Democrats inevitable.
