IMPORTANT INFORMATION TO TOBACCO MANUFACTURERS.

We are indebted to the courtesy of Jos. E. VENABLE, Esq., says the Petersburg Index, for permission to copy the following official information respecting the Tax on Manufactured Tobacco. It conveys the authoritative decision of the Department on a subject of general interest in the State:

DEAR SIR.—Feeling interested in the condition of those engaged in the Manufacture of Tobacco in your city, and other counties and cities of the State, I addressed a letter to the Commissioner at Washington, the day after my arrival home, and this morning received the following answer, which you and others can fully understand, and which, in my opinion, will give considerable relief to manufacturers of Tobacco in the South, and is an indication of the kind feelings of the Government towards its inhabitants.

(copy.)

1. Tobacco manufactured and removed from the place of manufacture in the Warehouse of the manufacturer, prior to Sept. 1st, 1862, is not liable to any tax.

3d. Tobacco manufactured prior to Sept. 1st, 1862, and still held by the manufacturer, but not at the place of manufacture, may be sold, either to be or not to be transported out of the territory lately in insurrection, without payment of any tax.

4d. Tobacco manufactured prior to Sept. 1st, 1862, and still held by the manufacturer, at the place of manufacture, to be or not to be transported out of the territory lately in insurrection, must pay the current rate of tax, if there be a collection district established embracing the residence of the manufacturer. If the collection district be established subsequently to such sale, or removal, no tax will be collected.

The Restoration of Civil Authority, as agreed upon between Generals Meade, Gilmore and Governor Parr, is announced in the following official document:

Proclamation by the Provisional Governor of South Carolina.

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, SOUTH CAROLINA,
September 4th, 1865.

Whereas an evening conflict of jurisdiction having arisen between the civil and military authorities of South Carolina, under the provisional government of the State; and whereas, Major General Gilmore, commanding the Department of South Carolina, having sought an interview with me as Provisional Governor, in the presence of General Meade, commanding the Atlantic States; and whereas, all matters giving rise to the seeming conflict were adjusted and arranged with the consent and approval of Major General Meade.

Now, therefore, I, Benjamin Franklin Perry, Provisional Governor of the State of South Carolina, do proclaim and make known that the terms of this arrangement are as follows: "That in all cases where freedmen or persons of color are concerned, the courts of the Provost Marshals shall have exclusive cognizance to try and adjust them, for the present; and that all other cases shall be heard and adjudicated by the civil courts, municipal authorities and civil officers, under and according to the laws of South Carolina. That the civil courts shall be opened under the provisional government, and all civil and municipal officers be allowed to resume their official duties, and discharge them freely, and without interruption, on the part of the military authorities. That it is further understood General Gilmore will issue a military order, and Governor Perry will, in like manner, issue his proclamation, making known this arrangement which is to continue till civil authority is entirely restored in this State, and the government reconstructed.

And I do hereby call upon all persons, and order them to strictly obey and carry out the terms of this arrangement.

NEGRO SUFFRAGE AND CITIZENSHIP.—The Columbus *Star* appeals to an editorial article on the subject of negro suffrage, the following, which it pronounces a short extract from one of the late President Lincoln's published speeches, delivered at Springfield during the famous contest for the Senatorship between him and Mr. Douglas:

Judge Douglas has said to you that he has not been able to get from me an answer to the question whether I am in favor of negro citizenship. So far as I know the Judge has never asked me that question before. He shall have no occasion to ever ask it again, for I tell him frankly that I am not in favor of negro citizenship.

My opinion is that the States have the power to make a negro a citizen under the Constitution of the United States if they choose. The Dred Scott decision decides that they have not that power. If the State of Illinois had that power, it should be opposed to the exercise of it.

A New Movement.
PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 14.—A movement has been started to form a national society for Christian work amongst the masses, like that of the Christian Commission amongst the soldiers and a convention is to meet in Cleveland on the 27th of September. The call is signed by upwards of a hundred distinguished men of twenty different States.
