LATE NEWS.

Later from Europe--Meeting of Bond-Holders. The steamer City of Boston, from Liverpool on the 6th, via Queenstown on the 7th, reached New York Sunday evening.

The Confederate bond-holders held a meeting in London on the 4th, and debated their prospects. Some of the speakers even contended that the Federal Government was responsible.

The Mark Lane Express fears that three-fourths of the English wheat crop will prove to be in bad condition.

The cattle plague continues its ravages, and is stated to have made its appearance in Ireland in the county of Donegal.

Independent Order of Old Fellows.

The Baltimore American, of yesterday, says: The annual sessions of the Grand Lodge of the United States will commence this morning at ten o'clock, in the saloon of the Odd Fellows, Gay street, and it is quite certain that representatives from nearly all the States of the Union, the District of Columbia, and from several British provinces, will be in attendance.

The Latest from Mr. Stephens.

The Baltimore Sun, of yesterday, says: Hon. Herschel V. Johnston of Georgia, passed through this city a few days ago on his return from a visit to Alexander H. Stephens, at Fort Warren, and reports him in ordinary health, having the freedom of the fort, and the privilege of receiving such friends as he desires.

Confederates in Mexico.

Private letters from Mexico tell us of the arrival in Mexico City of large numbers of Confederate officers. Among them are Gen. Jack Magruder, General Sterling Price, Gen. Stephens, late chief engineer in Lee's army; Governor Truxton Polk, Gen. Allen, of Louisiana; Gov. Isham G. Harris, of Tennessee; Judge Perkins, of Louisiana; Gen. Ledbetter, Gen. Wilcox, Judge Watkins, Colonel Semmes, Colonel Anglade, Colonel Davis, Major Kimmell, Major Mordecai, Captains Carroll, Wood, Cagle, Adams, of Missouri; Moore, of Alabama; Thompson, of Joe Johnston's staff, and Gregory. Lieut. Maury has been appointed to the Observatory in Mexico. Gen. Stephens has charge of the San Luis Potosi railroad. Messrs S. Barron and H. Meade, of Morgan's staff, and G. A. Boicher, late of the steamer Stonewall Jackson, have applied for lands to settle on permanently.

Hayti.

The rebellion in Hayti is still unabated. A letter from Fort on the 29th of August, published in a Jamaica newspaper, states that President Geffard, as already mentioned in the Herald, left Port au Prince on the 25th ult. for the seat of war, taking with him sixteen hundred men. The insurgents had been repulsed in all their advances, and the recapture from them of the town of Cape Haytien was daily expected. It was rumored that Fort St. Michael had already been captured by the national troops with sixty prisoners. Several of the Haytien newspapers denounce the excesses committed by the revolutionary leaders in breaking open stores and robbing merchants to pay their soldiers.

Kentucky Methodist Church Conference.

CINCINNATI, Sept. 15.--The Conference of the Kentucky Methodist Episcopal Church South, at its session to-day, adopted by a vote of 37 against 25, the minority report, which expresses a willingness to receive, though the General Conference only, an overture looking to re-union.

The report directly favored re-union. Seventeen of the Union members asked to be located, thereby resigning their ministerial functions. Others resigned their seats.
