The announcement that Bishops Eastburn, of Massachusetts, and Burgess, of Maine, have endorsed, verbally and in writing, the famous High Church pastoral address of Bishop Potter, of this diocese, is denied by some of the most intimate friends of these eminent divines, who also declare that statements of that character were put in circulation by interested parties with a view of influencing the action of the forthcoming general convention.
