FROM SOUTH COROLINA. Gov. Perry's Message.

New York, Sept. 19.—The steamer Quaker City has arrived from Charleston on the 16th. The Courier contains Gov. Perry's message to the State Convention. He acknowledges the death of slavery and counsels a wise, just and humane treatment of the freedmen, by which they may become as strongly attached to the whites as whilst they were slaves. Legislation, he says, will be required to regulate duties of employer and employee. The Governor suggests changes in the State Constitution, making it more popular

and republican in form. It is the reproach of South Carolina that it is less so than any other State in the Union. He is opposed to the extension of suffrage to the freedmen in their present ignorant and degraded condition, as little less than folly and madness. He contends that this is the white man's government and the white man's only. That the Supreme Court has decided that negroes are not citizens, and thateach Stale has the unquestions ed right to decide for herself who shall vote. He suggests the election by the people of the Governor, members of Congress, the Legislature and ential bleaters directly by the people; and that the Legislature should be elected and con-vened in session to order an election for Congressmen before the first Monday of December.

The future, he says, will be bright and glorious. As long as civilization continues, this great republic will flourish and increase in numbers, wealth and grandeur. In less than ten years we shall realize in the loss of slavery a blessing in disguise to ourselves and to our children. He notifies the convention of the re-establishment of the civil law and courts, and the withdrawal of the negro troops from the interior to the garrisons on the coast. The presence of white troops will, he says, be necessary for some time to enforce the relative duties of freedmen and employers.

Later From Europe.

Farther Point, Sept. 19.—The steamer Da-mascus has arrived. Her advices are to the 9th inst., but unimportant. Queen Victoria would return to England from Germany on the 8th. The French Minister of Agriculture had ad-

dressel a report to the Emperor on the cattle plague, and the Emperor has issued a decree prohibiting the introduction of passage through France of entite from England, Holland or Belgium.

Important Trade Circular.

The following important circular relative to Southern trade, was issued on Monday last by the Secretary of the Treasury:

- TREASURY DEPARTMENT, Sept. 18, 1855.

In the circular issued by this department on June 11, 1866, reference was made to the Provision contained in section 46, of the Internal Revenne Act of June 30, 1864, conferring upon the Secretary of the Treasury discretionary power in regard to the assessment, levy, time and manner of collection of taxes in the States lately in rebel-

Under the authority given by that section it was then stated that the Department, without waiving in any degree the rights of the Government in regard to taxes heretofore accruing, would not insist at present upon their payment, so far as they were payable prior to the establishment of a collection district embracing the terri tory in which the tax payer resided. It was fur ther provided that manufactured articles found in the hands of a purchaser, which were satisfactorily shown to have passed from the manufactubefore the establishment of the district, should not be subject to tax, unless transported beyond the limits of the State lately in insurrection. No exception was then made in favor of articles which had remained in the possession of the manufacturers, and thus become Hable to the tax imposed by the existing law.

The Department, preferring to test the practi-cal workings of the regulation before exercising its power of modification in this important par-ticular, representations since made relative to the hardship of this discrimination between manufacturer and purchaser, have been corroborated by careful inquiry, and induce the convic-tion that a further exemption is justifiable and ndvisable.

It is found that considerable quantities of man-ufactured products have been retained by the manufacturer in his own hands as the safest mode of investing his property, until the return of peace; that this retention was determined on and carried out without the knowledge or opportunity of knowledge of the law subjecting this property to a heavy taxistion on sale, and that a large part of the manufacturers so retained having been much deteriorated in value by the lapse of time

and want of proper attention, would not now sell for a sum equal to the tax.

A state of things so destructive to the usefulness of property and to the prosperity of the manufacturing classes is as adverse to the integrity of the Covernment as to those of the community. For these reasons it is hereby ordered that all articles, in whatsoever hands found, which can be shown to the satisfaction of the Assessor to have been manufactured before the establishment of the district, shall be held free from the present assessment or collection of tax, unless transported beyond the limits of the States

Manufacturers of articles liable to seigure for want of inspection marks will present to the Assessor evidence that such articles were manu-factured prior to the establishment of the district. and the Assessor, if satisfied, will cause such articles to be so marked as to be identified and

sold without liability to seizure. All articles transported beyond the limits of the States lately in insurrection will be subject to the tax due under the law in farce at the time they were manufactured.
