Alabama Convention.

MONTGOMERY, September 18th. via Mobile. September 20th. The election ordinance passed today authorizes the Provisional Governor to order an election for members of Congress.

The election of Mayor, Aldermen and Councilmen in Mobile takes place on the first Monday in December next. The third Monday in December is appointed for the meeting of the Legislature.

DEBATE ON THE ABOLITION OF SLAVERY. MONTGOMERY, Ala., September 20. The Convention to-day adopted a resolution requesting the Provisional Governor to call on the military in each county immediately, to represent the lawlessness, which exist in many counties.

New York Union Convention. Policy of President Johnson Endorsed.

SYRACUSE, September 20. The Republican State Convention organized to-day by choosing Chauncey M. Depew for President. He had previously withdrawn his name as a candidate for Secretary of State.

At the evening session, General James H. Martin was nominated for Attorney General. Henry J. Raymond reported, from the committee on resolutions a series congratulating the people on the overthrow of the rebellion and the return, the preservation of the Union, and the extermination of slavery.

The Freedmen's Bureau. An Important Tour of Inspection. General Howard left Washington on yesterday on a tour of inspection in Virginia, to examine into the condition of the freedmen, and the operations of the Freedmen's Bureau in that State.

A recent letter from General Lee, President elect of Washington college, to Judge Frockenbrough, states that he will be in Lexington on the 29th instant, to attend a meeting of the Board of Trustees to be held on that day; and that he will enter upon the duties of his office at the opening of the session.

We are gratified to learn that the amnesty oath of President Johnson is being very generally subscribed to by the citizens of this county, and we hope that by the day of election (next Thursday the 1st inst.) every one who is entitled to take it will have subscribed to it.
