NEWS BY THE PAPERS.

A STAGE TRAGEDY IN CHICAGO.

A Woman Shoots Her Husband at Wood's Theatre.

On Tuesday night last a tragedy occurred on the stage of Wood's Theatre, Chicago, which was not down on the hills. Just before the performance commenced an actor, named Beach, was shot by his wife for the following reason:

About twelve months ago Beach eloped and married a daughter of Mr. Alexander Handel, of Chicago. The girl was only seventeen years of age, with light curling hair, fair complexion, blue eyes, and was regarded as very pretty. The parties only lived together for a little while, the wife going to visit some friends in Buffalo, and the husband taking the position of "utility man" of Wood's Theatre. Some months ago the husband said that he went to Buffalo in disguise and there found that his wife was living in adulterous intercourse with another actor. He came back and filed a bill of divorce, which was printed in the newspapers. She seeing it immediately returned to Chicago and expostulated with him, promising if he would withdraw the bill she would again live with him. This he consented to do, but a week or two elapsed and he failed to fulfill his promise. She now threatened him and exacted another promise that he would comply with her wishes. Finding, after a few days, that he had not done so, she loaded a pistol, put several cartridges in her pocket, and on Tuesday night went to the theatre. Again she asked him to keep his promise, and on receiving his refusal she fired the pistol, the ball taking effect in the neck of Beach, near the spinal column. She dropped the pistol, and coolly walked away, but in a few minutes was arrested and taken to the police station. On the road she chatted pleasantly, and smiled as if she had not been guilty of any evil deed. Sometime afterward her father visited the station house, and expressed a wish to finish the job if his daughter had not done so. He was locked up. Beach, although badly wounded, may recover.

An Extraordinary Story of Treasures Discovered in Mount Cenis Tunnel.

NEW YORK, Sept. 22.—The World has an extraordinary story rivaling the "moon hoax," of gold and gems found by the square yard in Mount Cenis tunnel, including diamonds, sapphires, rubies, topaz, emeralds, gold, silver, malachite in endless profusion. The work in the tunnel was stopped, and France and Italy are dividing the spoils. The original discoverer was murdered by his fellow-workmen, one of whom was arrested by the Government. He had previously given his deposition of the facts of the discovery to the correspondent who furnishes the statement to the World.

Apprehended Difficulties at Mobile.

Mobile, Sept. 20.—Reports from Mobile represent the situation in that city and vicinity, with respect to the negroes; as so serious as to call for the immediate adoption of measures to prevent an outbreak. The Governor of the State is said to have ordered out a sufficient force for the purpose.

Alabama Convention.

MONTGOMERY, Sept. 23.—The Convention passed an ordinance dividing the State into six Congressional districts.

The Committee on the Secession Ordinance will report early next week.

SLAVERY ABOLISHED.

MONTGOMERY, ALA., Sept. 22.—The Convention has passed the Ordinance abolishing slavery by a vote of 89 to 3, against the amendment of the Constitution, and erasing all provisions relating to slaves.

The Legislature, next session, will undoubtedly pass laws to protect the freedmen in person and property, and guard the State against the evils arising from the sudden emancipation of the slaves.

Railroad Accident.

TAU, N. Y., Sept. 23.—A railroad accident occurred on the Rensselaer and Saratoga bridge this morning. The train consisting of a locomotive and two passenger cars, was backing towards the city, for the purpose of starting out again. The swing draw was open, and the usual signals displayed, but the engineer misunderstood them. The locomotive plunged into the water forty feet deep, followed by one passenger car. The other had a narrow escape.

Fortunately there were only three passengers on the train at the time. These were not in the submerged car, and escaped. The engineers and firemen escaped by jumping from the locomotive and clinging to the bridge.

The Cholera.

The Stats Department is in the receipt of voluminous despatches from our Consuls at Constantinople, Smyrna, Port Mahon and Barcelo, giving further information of the ravages of the cholera in various parts of Europe. The reports from Constantinople are most alarming, the deaths from this disease having reached the number of two thousand per day. At Smyrna the epidemic was checked some time since, but it has broken out afresh and is now spreading to a frightful extent.

From California---Treasure Coming Forward.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 18.—The steamship Colorado sailed to-day for Panama, with \$1,350,000 in gold for New York, and \$670,000 for England.

A discharged soldier named Joseph Graves, company B, Twenty-eighth Ohio Volunteers, with plenty of greenbacks and "great expectations" married Ceila Bowen, in Wheeling, the other day. Owing to some disagreeable rumors of pecuniary transactions a la Ketchum he fled from his young wife two days after the marriage.
