Great Fire at Constantinople.

FURTHER PARTICULARS—EIGHT THOUSAND HOUSES DESTROYED.

(Constantinople's Correspondence London Daily News.)

Roughly estimated it may be said that the disaster has laid waste nearly a quarter of the whole area of Constantinople proper, destroying, it is reckoned, about eight thousand houses, nearly twenty mosques, ten baths, five Christian churches, and some fifteen khans. No such calamity has befallen Constantinople during the present century, if indeed since the conquest.

Nearly half the space thus reduced to a desert of ashes was inhabited by the poorest musulman population, fifteen or twenty thousand of whom are thus reduced to absolute want. With its usual generous promptitude the government has not lost an hour in dealing out what relief it can to the poorest of the sufferers. Shelter has been given to nearly half of them in the empty khans and other available buildings, and most of the remainder have been camped under tents in the Hippodrome till wooden huts or other accommodation can be found. A ration of bread is also being served out to them at the Porte's expense, and, in short, every effort that the pinched means of the government will allow is being made to relieve the distress which the calamity has occasioned.

The Reported Attempt to Assassinate General Grant.

That portion of the press which is sensational or nothing, a few days since started a report that an attempt was made to kill General Grant by throwing a train of cars off the track of the Indianapolis and Cincinnati railroad. The story was pure invention. It was not even known at the place that General Grant would pass that night, and the switch which caused the accident was unattended, and not in good order. So, instead of there having been an attempt to murder the Lieutenant General, he was merely subjected to a risk to which travelers by rail are accustomed.—N. Y. News.

Prices in New York.

A letter from New York says: "We are rapidly drifting back to the war standard, not that products or provisions are scarce, but that speculators and middlemen are in a 'ring,' and combine together to fleece the public. Many families have discontinued the use of butter altogether. The best qualities are selling at 80¢ a pound. The commonest cheese is from 25 to 25 cents per pound. You can't get porterhouse steak for less than 30¢ a cent per pound, and if you affect a 'mutton chop,' you must pay from 25 to 30 cents for it. Family flour has advanced to 12¢ a pound, and the ten cent loaves the bakers are selling, bid fair to dwindle into proportions that will require a magnifying glass to enable a hungry man to see them."

The Fenians.

Our latest advices from Europe proclaim the fact that England has awakened from her sense of security; that the agitation in Ireland has alarmed the new Ministry, and that in Dublin, in Cork, in Duleary the Fenian leaders have been arrested; the Fenian newspapers suppressed; the Fenian arms and ammunition confiscated.

The information in our possession as to the numbers and resources of this association in Ireland, is too limited to admit of even a speculation as to the probable result of this decisive action of the Government. Whether the organization has been thorough, the spread of dissatisfaction general, the determination and objects of the society understood, we know not; but the Fenians this side of the water—but branches from the parent tree—have from their Grand lodges published manifestos and platforms, in view of a resolution to war against Great Britain, if needs be—and should these brethren in the Emerald Isle be ready of blows, as these American Fenians are of words, there will be resistance to the British Lion.

An interesting field of speculation is laid open by the development, of late, at least, dangerous proportions which this movement has assumed in Ireland. Upon the rolls of the society in America may be found the names of thousands of intelligent and energetic men, men high in position in our Government—Congressmen, Generals, Legislators.

They are pledged hands, lives, and fortunes to a support of the cause for which they are banded together.

In case of a conflict on the shores, which are red now with the blood of unsuccessful revolution, will these men be true to their oaths? Will the re-awakened voice of the Harp of Tara's Hall be strong enough to summon back these exiles sons to unequal battle with a powerful throne? Will the defeats, the imprisonments, the expatriation of former years, call to the Mitchell's, the Meagher's of to-day, as a warning or as a rallying cry? Will our American Irish go from quiet homes, and a new found peace, to battle for a memory on the chance of success?

We believe not, even should the United States Government allow the formation and departure of such an expedition.

The hopeless struggle for Right, which involves the loss of innocent life, the destruction of property, the suffering of coming generations, is more sinful, more deplorable, than a submission to inevitable Wrong; and the gallant foreigners, driven to war by prescription, the men who have once felt what it is to be taken in misfortune by those whom they have loved, will, we trust, avoid a useless strife, and leave the freedom of Ireland if she be not free, to the future with its iron hand of Destiny, its onward stride of Progress.—Petersburg Index.

SHIPMENT OF \$1,000,000 IN IRISH BONDS.—The steamers City of Boston and Erin, which sailed from this port Saturday, are said to have taken out \$1,000,000 in bonds for the use of the embryonic Irish Republic. It is extremely reported that as soon as these bonds reach Ireland matters will assume a more definite form, and a proclamation, also printed here, will be spread broadcast throughout the land.—N. Y. Times.
