From the Standard.
Card from Mr. Moore.
 Messrs. Editors.—I perceive that I have been misrepresented by the reports of the proceedings in the Convention in regard to an ordinance introduced by me on yesterday in respect to voters in the elections shortly to be held in the State. The cause of its introduction was this: On Saturday the ordinance for election was passed, and by it persons not qualified by the State Constitution to vote, were excluded from voting. After its passage, it occurred to me that many persons, recently come of age, might be excluded because they had not paid public taxes. To remedy this the ordinance of yesterday was introduced allowing those who might not have paid public taxes, to pay a poll tax before or on the day of election. This was the law of the Revised Code, and would have been sufficient, but there was no revenue law in force.
 After its introduction by me, the ordinance of Saturday was reconsidered, and Mr. Love, of Jackson, moved (and with my entire concurrence was carried) an amendment allowing such persons to vote without payment of any tax.
 I respectfully ask of such papers as have misstated my position to correct it.
