The Public Patronage.

The Washington correspondent of the New York "Commercial," thus writes concerning the dispensation of Executive papers :

"Secretary Seward, in his Auburn speech, laid down the doctrine that loyal men must sustain the Administration, and there are indi-cations that those holding Federal offices will be expected to stand by the President. More than this, Congressmen who oppose the Administration must not expect that their friends and proteges are to be permitted to retain fat offices while loyal supporters of the Executive policy have friends "out in the cold." Already there have been some significant changes at San-Francisco, at New Orleans, and at other points, nor are any new appointments being made except of men who stood by the President, and whose protectors in Congress stand by the President's policy. This can but produce an effect on Capitol Hill, as it has in years past, and it is already hinted that the loyal Tennessecans will receive their seat before a great while, as evidence that Congress desires to stand by the President."

Receipts at Baltimore of Southern Products. The first arrival from the South after the close of the war, (beyond what had been the army lines,) was about the latter end of April, when the little steamer Emma Dunn, from Richmond, came into port with a cargo of tobacco and cotton. Since that period, up to the close of business yesterday, there has been received at this port by steamers and vessels 6,238 bales of cotton, of which 2,048 bales came from Rich tain. mond, 1.503 bales from Savannah, 1,186 bales from different poin's in North Carolina, 761 bales from Norfolk, 418 bales from Petersburg, and 322 bales from Charleston. Of tobacco the receipts have been 17,515 packages, 5,554 boxes, and 1,780 cases manufactured, and 3,923 hogs-heads leaf, received from Richmond, Petersburg, Fredericksburg and North Carolina. The receipts of naval stores have been 2,582 barrels tar, 2,414 barrels rosin, and 374 barrels spirits turpentine, from North and South Carolina, Florida and Virginia. The trade in flaxseed has been quite large, 3,206 barrels and bags having been received from Richmond and Nor folk. Some 300 barrels and casks rice came from Sayannah and Charleston, and 11,576 bushels of wheat and 10,000 bushels corn were re-ceived from Virginia and North Carolina. Besides the above, immense quantities of shingles, stayes, lumber, dried fruit, &c., have reached this market from the rivers of North Carolina and Virginia, all of which bave found ready markets. - Baltimore Sun, 30th.

A Fearful Story of Hydrophobia-Death of Six Children from the Milk of a Bitten

The Madison (Wis.) Journal relates the folowing terrible story :

Some six or seven years ago a mad dog went brough the village of Waterloo, Jefferson couny, and bit a number of animals. Among others t snapped at the leg of a cow belonging to Mr. Babcock. The animal was examined, but no mark could be found, and it was supposed that it escaped being bitten. The animal was afterwards sold to a man by the name of Garrison, who used her milk very freely, as did two of his children. Some of the neighbors, included Mr. family, were also supplied with the milk of this cow. At different times during the time since the cow was bitten there has been ted States for \$4 a dozen.
