TAXES ON MANUFACTURES AND PRODUCTIONS. By the terms of the 83d section of the reve nuc law, the tax on manufactures and products are to be paid within ten days from the 20th day of each month, or on or before a day to be prescribed by the Commissioner, and for failure to pay within the prescribed time the tax payer is liable to a penalty of ten per centum on the amount of the tax. The Commissioner has de-cided that this penalty must be collected in all cases when a tax payer has become liable thereto, as the collector has no discretion in the mat-ter; but, in order to avoid all occasion for disentisfaction, collectors are advised to issue notes, to persons assessed, immediately upon the re-ceipt of the list, informing them of their liability under the law, and form 17 has been pre-pared for this purpose. It must be distinctly understood, however, that as this notice is not required by the terms of the law, but is entirely

gratuitous on the part of the revenue officers no person can claim an exemption from the penalty by virtue of the non-receipt of the notice. If the duties are not paid within the prescribed time, the collector will issue a demand (form 2), in the manner prescribed by section 28, and proceed to collect the amount, with the penalty and costs, by distraint. IMPORTANT TREASURY DECISION.

The Secretary of the Treasury some days ago received an application from a Western National Bank, asking that the deposits of Government disbursing officers be exempt from taxa-The matter having been referred to Gen eral Spinner, he gave an opinion to-day that the desposits of the disbursing officers of the United States with National banks designated as depositories are subject to tax like other deposits that are subject to taxation. The ground upon which he bases this is, that the banks have the benefit of such deposits, the same as individual deposits, and therefore ought to be taxed in the same manner.

THE VOLUNTEERS. The Secretary of War and Lieutenant General Grant are daily in receipt of letters from volunteers, asking that they be discharged from the service immediately, alleging that there re-mains no necessity for their further detention RESTORATION OF LOST TITLES TO SOUTHERN

ESTATES.

One of the greatest embarrassments resulting to property owners in the South by the late war is the loss of a vast amount of papers relating to the titles of land, and which in the occupa tion of their country seats by the Federal forces very generally suffered destruction by fire or other cause. To obvinte the difficulty now preother cause. To obviate the almounty now pre-vailing in many localities, in the transfer of lands with a reasonable show of title, the Gen-eral Land Office has ordered its agents through-out the Southern States to gatefully collect all vestiges and remnants of the records of their office and forward them to the commissioner at Washington, that new plats and other ar-chives pertaining to the funds may be supplied as far as possible. New maps are also being got up with all possible dispatch. It is well known that at the time of the invasion of the South many adventurers attached to the army secured many valuable papers and records relative to certain large estates, in the hope of owners of-fering heavy rewards for their restoration after the close of the war. It is the hope of the Com-missioner of Public Lands to be able to furnish so much of the missing data as: to prevent par-ties to the theft gaining by the documents they now withhold in expectation of a bribe.
