How then, can all these, not to cite many others which might be easily accumulated, consist with the theory of a "grad-

ual" process? Was the flood a "gradual" or immediate process? Were not Sodom and Gomorrah destroyed by sudden fire from Heaven ? We know who has warned his disciples that, "as it was in the days of Noah, when they were cating and drinking, &c., so shall the Son of 2. Is it not equally an assumption that the

events to which you refer—the conversion of the Jews and Gentiles, &c., are to occur before the millenium? Where is the testimony to sustain the statement? As the proof is upon the affirmant, if it be not forthcoming, we con-clude, logically, that it is not true, and conse-quently, the whole class of difficulties resting upon that hypothesis vanishes from our path.
But on the contrary, it is maintained that it is

Isaiah tell us: "Behohl his reward is with him, and his work before him," If the nations are all converted, and the millenium of peace, and righteousness and blessedness, already an accomplished fact before he comes, what "work is before him?" and why need he come at all !-The incongruity of such a theory is apparent, even on Pagan grounds, for they give us the maxim-"Nee Deus intersituisi," &c. "Let not ir in the scene except on ion worthy of his presence.
