THE SUFFRAGE VOTE IN THE HOUSE.

Some conservatives who voted for the suffrage bill are adopting all sorts of excuses for the summerists thrown by them—the object being to cast dust in the eyes of their constituents at home.

LOSS OF THE SCHOONER PATTIE MARTIN—DREADFUL SUFFERINGS.

HATTIE MARY, N. C., Jan. 18.—The schooner Pattie Martin was wrecked just outside the bar at this place during the night of January 7th. She went aground on the shoals and immediately filled. Her crew, consisting of four persons, were compelled to go into the rigging, where the Captain, Denis M. Smith, of Camden, N. J., was frozen to death in about three hours, and the colored cook about half an hour afterwards.

Harris J. Steelman, the mate, and Geo. W. Tolson, a resident of this island, lived until the 13th inst., when they were rescued by the pilots. The feet of both were badly frozen, but it is thought they will eventually recover.

Very little of the cargo has been saved, though the vessel has not yet gone to pieces. She lies where it is impossible to approach her except in a very calm sea, which is not likely to occur very often here at this season.

The Captain's remains have been removed from the wreck, and the negro cook will be removed to-day, as the weather is very calm.

THE SOUTHERN COLONY IN MEXICO—LETTER FROM GEN. STERLING PRICE.

Gen. Sterling Price writes under date of Cordova, Mexico, December 16th, as follows: "I write in camp and without shelter, but upon my own six hundred and forty acres near the town of Cordova and the railroad leading from Vera Cruz to the city of Mexico. The lands in this vicinity are not surpassed by any of the Platte lands in fertility of soil, and in the finest climate I ever saw, the thermometer never above ninety degrees or below seventy, and in full view of mountains covered with perpetual snow. I am gratified to be able to say that as soon as the survey was completed, the thirty Colonists now here unanimously tendered me choice sections. I think I have made a judicious selection. I have donated to the colonists twenty-four acres for a town site on a rushing stream of water and by a large spring of excellent water."

"We have laid off the ground into towns and lots, and named it Carlotta, after the Empress, and we are all upon our lots clearing away the brush to erect our houses. I write to my family to-day to join me here as soon as they can raise the means to do so. I cannot think of returning to the States and be required to ask pardon for the action I took in the struggle. I would do the same again under similar circumstances. I did all that my talents enabled me to do to avert the calamity of war. I was not a sectionalist, but when the struggle came I did not hesitate to take the side of the South."

"I pray to God that my fears for the future of the South may never be realized; but when the right is given to the negro to bring suit, testify before courts, and vote in elections, you all had better be in Mexico."

"There is no doubt of the stability of this government; French troops are arriving every week, and the marauding bands that have infested the country for ages past are fast being exterminated; no quarters are given."

"When the character of our lands is well understood, immigration will be a fixed fact under any circumstances, and the finest lands that can be procured at low rates will command large prices. I have never known the cultivation of lands to yield such large profits. My neighbor, Mr. Pink (a man of science), cultivated eighty acres in coffee with ten hands, and sold his last year's crop for \$18,000. His coffee field, shaded with every variety of fruit trees, in full bearing, and the walks fringed with the pineapple, is the most beautiful sight I have ever seen. WASHINGTON, Dec. 21. DECISION RELATIVE TO RIGHTS OF REBEL PROPERTY.—A FLOOD OF RECONSTRUCTION LEGISLATION—THE SENATE AND NEGRO SUFFRAGE.

The Quartermaster General has made a decision adverse to compensating for rents of property used by the United States military in rebel States during the war.

There are about fifty or sixty members of the House who have notified the Speaker of their intention to make speeches on reconstruction.

The indications in high sources of Republicanism to-night, are that the Senate shiver in the wind on the House negro suffrage bill, and that it will not pass.

THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT.

The constitutional amendment reported in both branches of Congress to-day from the Committee on Reconstruction, is the same in substance as that submitted by Representative Blaine, of Maine, on the 8th inst.

THE TROOPS IN NORTH CAROLINA.

Several paymasters will start to-morrow for North Carolina to pay off the troops on duty in that State. This completes the payment of the army up till December 31st.
