Corporation Proceedings.

Regular meetings of the Board of Commissioners, held this evening.
Present - Col. Wm. H. Harrison, Mayor.
Messrs C. M. Farris, D. L. Royster, C. B. Root, A. Sorrell, P. Overby, N. S. Harp, Dr. W. H. McKee, R. W. Haywood, and H. Mahler, Commissioners.

The committee on salaries and revival of the City charter report - that they find the funded debt of the city to be \$34,000, with a floating debt of \$2,000 \$47,000 of this is a part of the subscription to the Chatham and Coastal railroad, the original amount being 30,000, which was authorized by the citizens themselves. These bonds were issued by the city and paid over to the Treasurer of the State, who issued the same amount of State bonds, and paid them over to the President of the Railroad, to be sold for his benefit, and to pay the subscription of the city. It is held by some that the city is no longer liable for their redemption, as the Convention, by a special ordinance repudiated all bonds or debts contracted during the war. This is a matter which the committee are unable to determine, and it is for the Legislature hereafter to decide. It is the duty, however, of the city to provide for the payment of the interest until a legal decision can be had.

The charter is under consideration, and is now in the hands of the City Attorney for legal correction. It will be reported to the Board before it will be presented to the Legislature.
The committee suggest for the consideration of the Board, the following salaries for the present year:
Mayor, \$1,000; Clerk, \$350; Treasurer, \$250; Principal Constable, \$60 per month; Assistant Constables, \$30; watchmen, \$1.50 per night; street hands, \$1.50 per day, and 2 1/2 per cent. for collecting taxes.

The committee submit to the Board the following table to show what is likely to be the expenses of the City government for the present year:
Interest on bonded debt, \$3,340
Salaries, 4,930
Watchmen, 7,300
Hands on Street, 3,000
Wagon hire and stone, 3,000
Lights, 2,300
Pumps, 800
Graveyard, 800
Contingencies, 6,000
Total, \$30,470

In making the present list, the committee were governed by the salaries paid last year. There are at this time four constables in the employ of the city; heretofore, two only were required. The four are now necessary and should be continued for the present. The number may be reduced to two after civil law is fully established; and the night watch may be further reduced in a few months, which will lessen the expenditures several thousand dollars.

In laying the incoming tax for the present year, it is the duty of the Board to provide an adequate amount to defray the current expenses, and interest on the bonds. From the statement which is here submitted, it will be seen that the sum of \$30,000 will have to be raised, to answer the purpose.

Retrenchment is earnestly recommended, and it is for the Board to determine what means may be taken to accomplish so important a matter, involving the credit and prosperity of the city.

On motion of Dr. McKee, ordered that the Mayor be requested to attend the meeting of the stockholders of the Chatham Coalfield Railroad Co., to be held on Thursday, Feb. 1.

The Board proceeded to fix salaries of officers for 1866, viz:
Mayor, per annum, \$1,000.00
Clerk, 350.00
Treasurer, 250.00
Chief Constable, per month, 60.00
Assistant Constable, 30.00
Watchman, per night, 1.50
Street hands, per day, 1.50
2 1/2 per cent allowed for collecting city taxes.

J. J. Christophers was elected City Collector.
Mr. C. W. Beves petitioned the Board to be recommended to County Court to have license to retail spirituous liquors at his place of business near the R. & G. Railroad depot, which was granted.

Mr. S. Bryan resigned his situation as night watch, and on motion of Dr. McKee, ordered that the vacancy remain for the present.

On motion of Mr. Root, ordered that the Mayor be requested to notify the North Carolina R. R. Co., to have the street and crossings around the depot put in good order; and if they fail to comply, enter suit against them; and that the commissioners from Western ward, see that it is properly done.
Mr. Farris offered the following resolution which was adopted:
Resolved, That all dogs and goats found running at large in the city, shall be impounded, and a tax of \$1 be imposed on each and every dog or goat so taken up, and after the 15th day of February.

Dissolution of Copartnership.

THE firm heretofore known as that of Baker, Cooper & Co. has this day been dissolved by mutual consent. The debts owing on one of the partners as Cashier of the Bank of Cape Fear, and the removal of the other to Norfolk (his residence before the war) for the purpose of practicing law, have raised this dissolution. The business will be continued by Mr. Pulaski Cooper and Mr. James A. Moore, late Teller of the Bank of Cape Fear, and under the name and style of Cooper & Moore, who will settle on the business of Baker, Cooper & Co.
