But he was at once referred to the subject to the Gorpa Legislatif that he would withdraw his troops from Mexico, fully confirms the dispatch I sent you last night to that effect. It does not follow, however, that Maximilian DISSOLUTION. will also leave Mexico. On the contrary, there is reason to believe that he will stay for some time and exercise his imperial functions with the tacit consent of the United States govern-ment. When the proposal was made to recog-nize Maximilian in case the French troops were withdrawn, Mr. Seward declined, but it is un derstood here that assurances were, nevertheless, given that there would be no attempt to interfere with the new empire during the term of the present administration after the withdrawal of Marshal Bazaine and his forces. It will be a full year before all the French leave, and by thin time the foreign legion, with the discliplined Mexicans, will be able to keep the country in

Now that the French troops are to go, it is expected here that the feeling against the em-pire will abate. A return of Juares to power would, it is alleged, plunge Mexico into anarchy and destroy the trade which is now slowly reviving. A few years of the present rule in Mexico would immensely stimulate commerce in the United States.

The action of the Emperor Napoleon furnishes a key to the reticence of President Johnson in his message on the Monroe Doctrine, and also accounts for the prompt mustering out of General Weitzel for his incomiderate zeal on the Rio Grande. The tolerance toward the new empire which is soon to be manifested at Washinton will also show that there is, and has been a perfect understanding between the Tulicries and the White House.

RESTORATION.

There are unmistakable indications of a bet-ter feeling taking firm hold in the House, in the treatment of the measures for the restoration of the Southern States to their place in the Union. One by one we find those who have been acting apparently in harmony with the Radicals in some of their extreme and sometimes harsh measures, coming out in plain terms in favor of magnanimity toward the conquered South as a duty on the part of the victors. Hon. James R. Hubbell, of Ohio, in an able speech delivered last night, placed himself unqualifiedly upon the record in favor of this dectrine, and legalizing by appropriate legislation in Congress, the civil governments formed under the direction of the President in the lately rebellious States.

CONTESTED SEAT. On Tuesday last a vote way taken by the House Committee on the contested election case for the 7th Congressional District of Indiana, in which the seat of the Hon D. W. Voorhees is contested by Colonel Washburne. The result of that yote was in favor of Mr. Voorhees, all the members voting for him, it is said, except the chairman, Mr. Dawes. In the meantime the committee has reconsidered their vote of last week, and this morning another vote in committee took place, the result of which was that the entire committee voted in favor of giving the seat to Colonel Washburne.

THE PREEDMEN'S BUREAU. The Freedmen's Bureau bill came promptl up, to-day, under the previous question, and the votes on the several propositions were promptly taken. Green Clay Smith's amend-ment, to except Kentucky, was rejected—ayes 54, noes 181. Mr. Stevens then demanded the ayes and noes on his very radical substitute and his Democrat allies, who hoped to make another point against the Union party in the House, backed up his demand, and the ayes and noes were ordered. For Mr. Stevens' prop-osition there were 37 votes; against it, 126.— The proposition involved the giving of home-steads to the freedmen from the forfeited lands of the public enemy, which is in accordance with the oft-declared doctrine of Mr. Stevens, and these thirty-seven votes are the entire fraction of the Union party in the House which indorse Mr. Stevens' peculiar views, and the number is significant of the estimate in which his theory of conquered territory is held.

WEST VIRGINIA. The debate on the subject of West Virginia to-day elicited on the part of two or three prominent gentlemen in the House an expression of more definite opinion concerning the status of States lately in rebellion than they have heretofore given. Mr. Stevens took occasion to heretofore given. Mr. Stevens took occasion to deny that he had ever maintained that those deny that he had ever maintained that those States were dead. He said that he agreed with Mr. Raymond that they were States and had always been States throughout the rebellion; that they had laws and organized governments, and were in full activity as States. The only difference between him and Mr. Raymond on this point was, that while he held them to be States of the Confederacy, and not on the Union. of the Confederacy, and not of the Union, while the Confederacy lasted, Mr. Raymond maintained that they were both States of the Union rightfully, and States of the Confederacy de facto, but he had never maintained that they were dead States, or that they ceased to be States at all. He had voted for the admission of West Virginia not because the old State of Virginia had given her consent to the erection of West Virginia not because the did State of Virginia had given her consent to the erection of this new State within her limits—for being to State of the Confederacy and not of the Union, she had no right to give her consent at all—but because West Virginia had been formed out of territory which we had conquered, and therefore had a right to dispose of. West Virginia was purely a creature of revolution and not of law. Mr. Hingham, of Ohlo, took occasion to protest against this doctrine is very distinct terms. He denied that we had conquered any nortion of the territory of the United States in the recent war. We had conquered the rebellion, and not territory. He said he had always maintained that those robel States were still within the Union, and that the loyal men of them to organize a government, and wherever and whenever they could do so, were entitled to recognition in the rightful authority of the or recognition as the rightful authority of the tate. As the loyal people of old Virginia had regarded a State government for that State, and had given their consent to the division of

the State, he (Mr. Bingham) had voted for its recognition, and he held that West Virginia was to-day as much a creature of law and of Washington Extracts.
