The Union Men.

Messrs. Editors:—I am neither unfriendly nor an enemy to any sound, consistent Union man, who was really so before the war.

Mr. Pool's history as well as they do others, to whom they are fond of applying epithets which belong fully as much to themselves and Mr. Pool, as to any other man.

"Mr. Doolittle presented the credentials of John Pool, Senator-elect from North Carolina, in doing so, Mr. Doolittle stated that he owed it to the Senate as well as to himself to state that Mr. Pool was and always had been a devoted friend of the Union."

"It is true Mr. Pool was a Union man in 1860, when he ran for Governor against Gov. Ellis. And then the Standard and Progress opposed him. But was Mr. Pool a Union man when he ran on the electoral ticket of Jefferson Davis in 1864?"

Chief Justice Daggett, and known to the profession for several years as Chief Justice of Connecticut, in giving his opinion, which may be found in the 10th volume of Connecticut reports page 347, uses the following language:

God forbid; that I should add to the degradation of this class of men; but I am bound by my duty to say; they are not citizens. Again the naturalization laws of Congress, passed in obedience, to the requirements of the constitution, have always carried through the same distinction.

Ohio in 1867, prohibited a "Free Negro" from settling in that State, unless he gave a bond of \$500 for good behavior; and that he should not become a pauper."

Indiana in 1858, and Michigan in 1857, adopted the same policy. In 1848 New York by a large majority of votes, refused to confer upon "Free Negroes" the elective franchise.

What kind of a "citizen" would the committee recommend? Certainly not one who has the privilege of exercising the elective franchise, or the qualification, which would enable him to vote for rulers, and to purchase and hold real estate.

Beside this I know of no other kind of "citizenship," as known to the Federal or State governments. Again, suppose by Legislative enactment, you declare him to be a citizen as recommended by the committee does that make him so?
