## WASHINGTON MATTERS.

The Political Cauldron at Washington—Terms for the Admission of Tennessee—The Joint Resolution—The President will Veto It.

(Correspondence of the Richmond Examiner).

WASHINGTON, March 5.

The country will be annoyed at the terms proposed by the Reconstruction Committee for the admission of representatives from Tennessee—but I am not sure that, in the present state of political feeling, Congress will be supported in the measure, accompanied as it is with a voluminous record of testimony in regard to the condition of that State. Some of the Republican members are themselves unprepared to endorse and sustain such a measure. Moderate friends seem to prevail among some of them, as I informed you yesterday.

The joint resolution, as we understand it now, is based upon the radical theory that the eleven seceded States are not only out of the Union, but that they must comply with conditions precedent to their admission into it. Tennessee may be admitted into the Union, upon a footing with the original States, upon its compliance with certain conditions precedent. The resolution does not admit of representation from these States before the compliance of the States with those conditions. The conditions are, in some respects, new, but may be complied with. This resolution is joint, and will go to the President for his approval. There is no doubt that any more than there was as to the bill for the admission of Texas or of Missouri. The committee have, of course, counted votes in both Houses, and have duly weighed the political consequences of the measure. Were they not quite certain of carrying the measure, they would hardly have ventured upon it.

This is the move upon which Congress proposes reconstruction, in opposition to the President's plan. Of course, it draws a deep line between Congress and the President.

Mr. Rogers made a minority report, providing for the immediate admission of Senators and Representatives from the State of Tennessee. The Committee will undertake, as soon as the documents shall be printed and laid before Congress, to push the measure to a vote, under the previous question.

The President's friends in the Tennessee delegation, if he has any, will themselves object to the measure. But it is rumored that this very stringent measure is reported with the consent of the Tennessee delegation.

Secretary Seward on Reconstruction.

WASHINGTON, March 4.—In a conversation yesterday with a leading member of the Pennsylvania Congressional delegation, Secretary Seward brought up the question of reconstruction, and was very severe upon Congress for their refusal to admit the Southern delegation. The member thought that after four years of a rebellion that had taken millions of armed men to suppress, and entailed upon us a debt of three thousand millions of dollars, it was the duty of Congress to patiently examine into the question of whether the same men were in a fit condition to be again entrusted with the political power of this Government; that no rebel should ever have a seat in Congress with his consent; that the policy of the President was lamentable, as it would prove a positive injury to the South.

Mr. Seward replied, with a great deal of warmth, that the policy was that of Mr. Lincoln had adopted, and was carrying it out when he died, and that Mr. Johnson was merely continuing it; that the people would sustain it, and there was not a rebel to day in the whole country, and he should not use the word. Mr. Seward is in favor of the admission of the entire body of Southern members, just as they are, and of the repeat of the test oath.

## TRIAL OF CAPTAIN SEMMES.

A report, seemingly well authenticated, prevails in Washington that the government has decided not to bring Admiral Semmes to trial, on the ground that his parole given at the time of Johnston's surrender entitles him to immunity so long as its conditions are observed.

We learn that the old veteran and patriot, General Scott, unhesitatingly endorses all that President Johnson uttered in his speech on the 22d ult.
