STROPSIS OF TESTIMONY.

THIRTY-THIRD DAY.

Monday, April 23, 1866.

Examination of Captain Fugua continued :-Major Gee had no choice of sentinels for the prison; he received those that were sent to him by the officer commanding the troops. He was allowed men from Freeman's battalion, for special posts, as prison officials. After the guard was mounted, the way it was to be divided into reliefs had to be explained to the officers. When the reliefs were divided, the deficiency in the number of the guards was discov-

The Commandant of the prisoners could not remove or change the Surgeons; don't know whether he could give them orders. I do not think an order in regard to the policing of the prison could have been given to the Surgeons, which they were bound to obey—that was the duty of the officer of the day. I think nothing better could have been done in regard to cleanli-

Think Major Gee had no control over Quartermaster and Commissary, Maj. Morfit did not recognize Maj. Gee's authority over him. There was a placard on Morfit's work-shops prohibiting anybody from going into them. The order was general, no exceptions to it. He claimed that his department was separate and distinct. He went to Danville or to Richmond without Gee's permission.

The original ground in the prison was higher toward the centre and rocky; it had the appear-

ance of being macadamized.

Maj. Gee telegraphed to Richmond that if
Col. Hinton's regiment and Snead's company
were removed, the phisoners could not be secured.

The removal of these troops decreased the name ber of sentinels, so that each post was extended from 20 to 30 yards. This was the case at the time of the outbreak, I think.

It was customary to parole prisoners, who were given passes to go out. I don't know that all were paroled-don't know any that were not. The prisoners could easily dig under the pat-isade. The portion of ground in the rear was light and soft. A man might scratch, through-with his hands. About the time the officers were taken away, the sentinels on the line be-tween the officers and the enlisted men saw pieces of papers attached to stones thrown across the life. They recovered some of them; I saw them. One was a plan, at a given signal, for the chiefs of divisions and officers to lead a ling. The congregation is large and serious, and rising. After the discovery of these papers, the officers were removed to Danville—1 think by Major Gee's order. He communicated with authori ties at Richmond. There was no further shelter than those tents provided for the prisoners. I think the guards uilt shulters for themselves of rails, pieces of plank and such things. They commenced to cut trees, on the lawn of a gentleman between a mile and a mile and a half-of the prison, and I was ordered to go and stop them. Shelters could have been made for the prisoners if the land had belonged to the government.

I don't recollect Major Gee giving any order

as to digging the burrows in the ground. No one clse about there but priseners of war lived in that kind of burrows; some of the troops dug a foot or two in the ground and bullt a shelter over it. The burrows were comfortable in dry weather. The ground not more damp than ground ordinarily is,
