

TERMS OF SUBSCRIPTION.

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Proceedings of Congress.

WASHINGTON, May 1st. SENATE.—The Senate discussed the Postoffice bill. Mr. Trumbull presented the petition of 144 citizens of Staunton, Va., representing that the troops have recently been withdrawn from that place—that the Union men were being persecuted by the rebels—and praying the return of the troops for the protection of the loyal men.

Mr. Sherman said that he could not allow this charge of this most impudent rebel against the whole army to be entered upon the records without some answer. The charge of Gen. Sherman in relation to the burning of Columbia was in an official report, and was fully sustained by the reports of other officers. Gen. Sherman did not charge that Hampton gave an explicit order on the subject, but simply that his previous orders in relation to the burning of cotton, etc., led to that result.

Mr. Eliot, of Mass., offered a resolution reciting that in view of the alarming destitution prevailing in the South, especially in Arkansas, Alabama and South Carolina, the Committee on Freedmen be requested to enquire into the expediency of appropriating \$100,000, to be expended in the distribution of rations of food, under the direction of the Freedmen's Bureau.

The bill making appropriations for the uses of the Freedmen's Bureau was passed. It will require over \$11,000,000. Among the items are the following: For salaries for commissioners \$147,500; for salary of clerks, \$92,800; for stationary and printing, \$69,000; for fuel, \$45,000; for clothing, \$1,700,000; for commissary stores, \$4,300,750; for medicines, \$500,000; for transportation, \$1,300,000; for school superintendents, \$1,500,000; for school-houses, \$18,000.

The Report of the Reconstruction Committee—Sentiments of the President and his Cabinet—Noble Position of the President. WASHINGTON, May 1.—It is understood that at the Cabinet meeting to-day the President invited an expression of opinion from the Heads of Departments respecting the recent report of the Reconstruction Committee, and it is reported that in an animated discussion which ensued thereupon, Secretaries Seward, McCulloch, Welles and Stanton were decided in their opposition to the plan of the Committee, and earnest in their support of the President's policy of restoration.

The President was emphatic in his opposition to the Committee's report. He declared himself against all conditions precedent to the admission of loyal Representatives from the Southern States, in the shape of amendments to the Constitution, the passage of laws, &c. He insisted that under the Constitution no State could be deprived of its equal suffrage in the Senate, and that the Senators and Representatives from the South ought to be at once admitted into the respective Houses, as prescribed by law and the Constitution.

He was for a strict adherence to the Constitution as it is, and remarked that having sustained ourselves under it during a terrible rebellion, he thought the Government could be restored without a resort to amendments; and he further remarked, in general terms, that if the organic law is to be changed at all, it should be at a time when all the States and all the people can participate in the alteration.

The Late Confederate Loan—Correspondence between the English Bond-Holders and Secretary Seward. The Secretary of State, by direction of the President, has examined certain papers submitted to him relating to the late Confederate Loan. Among them is a communication dated London, March 10, 1866, and signed by Sir, Provo Wallis, K. C. D., E. Morgan, Secretary, Francis Phillips, C. M. T. Weston, W. M. Morgan, J. M. Howey. The plan which they propose is that the United States Government shall furnish to that committee a copy of the contract which they say was made between Erlanger & Co., of Paris, and the late Confederate Government at Richmond, together with the particulars of the settlement of the same. The committee promise that the outstanding Confederate cotton loan bonds shall be delivered up to agents of the United States for cancellation, the bond-holders to guarantee that either they or their friends will subscribe Northward to a new loan to be created by the cotton and tobacco States, for five million pounds (\$8,000,000) at fifty per centum, payable in London. The money to be used solely in developing the resources of these States. In the event of the credit of the Southern States being restored, through the influence of the new mentioned operation, a second loan of \$5,000,000 is to be taken at sixty per centum, within three months after the placing of the first loan upon the market. In the event of such second loan being successful, then a loan for \$10,000,000 is to be taken at seventy per centum, after a like interval of time.

After reviewing the above mentioned and other communications submitted, the Secretary of State says: "I am of the opinion that neither the nature of these several communications, nor the matters discussed therein, nor the claims which they are therein made, nor the character of their authors, nor that of their agent, is such as to deserve consideration on the part of the Government of the United States."
