Public Meeting.

At a meeting held in the town of Hillsboro' to send delegates to the District Convention, to be held in the city of Raleigh, the following proceedings were had:

James F. Clark, Esq., acted as Chairman, and Dr. Charles J. Freeland, as Secretary of the meeting.

Hon. Josiah Turner, being called upon to ex-plain the object of the meeting, rose and said: The purpose of the meeting was to send dele-gates to the Quakercity, on the 14th of August next, then and there to determine and settle the comprehensive question, whether the American people shall be governed by the free principles of a written Constitution, or the despotism as laid down and enforced by a successful and tri-

laid down and enforced by a successful and triumphant party.

The object of the Philadelphia Convention
commended itself to the Intelligence and patriotism of every man who pretended to any concern for the public welfare and the perpetuation
of free institutions.

The people, wearled with waiting for Congress to restore peace, tranquility and representation to one family of the American citizens,
have determined to take their own affairs into

their own hunds—and do what an unwilling Congress has failed to do.

Por his own part he preferred this grand move should be left alone with the Northern people. The Northern despots of party have but one argument against the Philadelphia Convention. Treason and traitors, they say, will be there. If we absent ourselves from the Convention we draw their fire—we rob them of their thunder. draw their fire—we rob them of their thunder. But it may be said this is harmless theatrical thunder. So it is to us; but it kills every man north who speaks a word of hope or comfort to the South. Already a Cabinet Minister has seceded, or rather resigned, and one reason given for resigning is that the President favors the Philadelphia Convention; in other words because the President allows and encourages the people to assemble and discuss political grestions. What a reason for his resignation! A eltis it fur the broad brims and shad coats of William Penn's city, that the Secession Minister is not President. If he were President, the Philadelphia Convention might be adjourned with adelphia Convention might be adjourned with grape and canister. It was now too late to argue the expediency of sending delegates from the South to the Philadelphia Convention. He regarded the question as settled; it only re-mained for us to send our best men.

Mr. Turner spoke of the despotism of party sa no more to be endured than the despotian of Monarchy. He feared we would have to endure the despotism of the present party for an indefi-nite period; at all events until the Northern

nite period; at all events until the Northern people changed the complexion of Congress by their action at the polls. Mr. Turner concluded by offering the following resolutions:

Resolved, let That we, a pertion of the people of Orange county, have seen with approbation the proposition to hold a Convention in the city of Philadelphia on the 14th of August next, to promote the policy of the President of the United States in restoring all the States to representation in Congress, and the enjoyment presentation in Congress, and the enjoyment their rights under the Constitution, and will site with our fellow citizens in other parts of North Carolina in sending delegates to said Convention.

Convention.

Resolved, 2nd. That delegates be appointed by the Chairman of this meeting, to meet in Raleigh with the delegates from other counties of the district, to appoint suitable delegates to said Philadelphia Convention.

Resolved, 3rd. That the proceedings of this meeting be handed to the Hillsborough Recorder for publication, and that the Releigh Sentinel and other papers favorable to the sentiments thus expressed be requested to publish the same.
