"In view of the circumstances surrounding us

when it is remembered that the State has just
emerged from a long and disastrous war, in which not only her sons but her resources were prodigally bestowed—that our banks have all been destroyed—that more than three hundred millions of property have been annihilated that all the fountains for credit and property have been broken up-that our system of labor has been thoroughly disorganized—that the refreshing and revivifying showers have been withheld from a parched and exhausted soil, and that want, if not famine, will keep ghastly vig-ils in masslon and in bovel; when it is remembered that nearly all of the merchants of the State have been able to compromise their indebtedness to Northern creditors on most liberal terms, surely, the creditor class will practice forbearance and give their debtors still further indulgence. If compelled to enforce collections, they should, in the same fair and liberal spirit, make compromises with debtors so as not to drive them and their tamilies from home, kin-

dred and friends.

The existing embarrasements growing out of the indebtedness of the country will, like other evils, produce beneficial results. Debtors will find it to their interest to make final adjustment of their debts, even though they are com-pelled to surrender their property. As long as their debts remain, interest will be accumulatheir decise remain, interest will be accumula-ting, to culminate in more disastrons bankrapt-cy. If they surrender their property now to cred-itors, they can resume their occupations and labor with cheerfulness, knowing that its proceeds will sooner or later re-build their The debtor who desires to compromise with

his creditors has the means of compelling the veriest Shylock to accept fair terms or exclude him in all share of his estate by assignment, giving liberal creditors the preference, or by voluntary confession of judgment.

Believing that no stay law can be passed em-

bracing antecesient debts, that will not conflict with that clause of the constitution of the United States which declares that "no State shall pass any law impairing the obligation of contracts," I respectfully recommend for your consideration, for the relief of debtors-

1st. That imprisonment for debt on mesne and dual process be abolished, except in case of fraud; and then as a punishment for the crime, rather than as a means of enforcing payment of

2d. That no costs be taken against a defendant, either for the officers of the court or for

Sir : I reply to your letter of the 4th inst., that the first Internal Revenue Act took effect, so far as related to stamp duties, October 1st, 1862. Imeruments executed and delivered prior to that date, though they may be record-ed afterwards, are not chargeable with stamp

Any instrument issued after the above date, without the proper stamps, may be presented to the collector by the parties, or any persons in-terested, in order to have the requisite stamps affixed, and cancelled. Such an instrument issued at a time when, and in a place where no collection district was established, may be stamped by the party who issued it, or by any party having an interest therein, at any time prior to January 1st, 1867. When originals are ost the necessary stamps may be affixed to coples duly proven.
