We behold in the Jews a people whose records show lewer marriages, a smaller number of children, and tewer deaths of them in a family, a smaller number of still-bors, more old perso fewer suicides, a larger mean duration of life. The Israelite weighs carefully the responsibilities and cares of matrimony, and as slower in taking on its bonds. If the marriages of his people are less fruitful, more time is allowed for a mother's care and tenderness, and hence the less propor-tionate mortality of Jewish children to the population at large. Mr. Legoyt expresses his sur-prise at the large number of Jews who live to a very advanced age. Their temperate habits ex-plain in a good degree this favorable result.— Their sobriety has always been known; intoxication is rare—institual drunkands can hardly be found. We see here a practical commentary on the saying of the celebrated Haller, that by far the larger number of those who were noted

for their longevity were sober and lived plainly.

To this course the Jews would be naturally led by the dietetic inculcations of the Mosaic laws. The love of family, so strong in the Jew ish people, insures constant care of the children and the aged, and to their poor assured and ju-dicious assistance. Their charity is without limit. Their fortitude and screnity of mind under trials are marked features of their character and can only be accounted for by their deep faith and confidingness in an overruling Provi-

The Jewish population in the different countries of Europe is estimated, in a table before us, to be 3,692,132, Prussia not included. Russia contains the largest number, 1,425,784. Next comes Austria, 1,048,174. Third on the list is Poland, 599,875. England shows 45,000 and Ireland the lowest figure of all, being only 322. The National Almanae for 1864 sets down the Jewish population of the United States at 200,000. This is an estimate and evidently not 200,000. too high.

And he kept his word, and a few days ago, despite the hard times, John discharged the obligation in full.
