CANDY ADVERTISEMENTS—Our new health esthetic is bringing to light some queer things. The common candies and confectionaries of commerce are not altogether toothsome or wholesome, if recent investigations are to be believed.

The adulteration of sugar, candies and spices is a trade largely and regularly carried on. Instead of plaster, which till lately entered so largely into the manufacture of confectionery in place of sugar, a new article has been discovered called terra ocrea, or white earth. It comes from Ireland, and costs by the barrel one and a half cents per pound while loaf sugar costs about seventeen cents. The bodies of candies, the coating of almonds and lozenges are made from this earthy material.

It is a white plaster, and is very much used in the adulteration of flour. A glue, paint and oil manufacturer of New York has sent round his annual circular, to the principal confectioners, calling attention to a fresh arrival of this white earth.

The common method of flavoring candies, almonds, sugar plums, etc., is with deteriorated substances. The pineapple flavor, the banana and the peach are made from fruit oils, which are very poisonous. After almonds flavor is made from cyanide acid unacidulated. Pine apple flavor is obtained from rotten cheese, very rotten, and stitid.

Grape arctic for pure gum drops is costly. An article has been invented of the most beautiful appearance, that is used instead of the gum.

In pure candy cochineal is used to color red, and saffron for the yellow. But in the common candies poisonous coloring is put, the same that is used to color wines and liquors. One of the most common is "Carthage," into which arsenic is largely entered. A few grains of the substance will color a cake of wax. Licorice drops for the "straw" are made of poor brown sugar, glue and lamp-black, flavored with licorice. Much of the cream of tartar used for bread is made of terra ocrea and tartaric acid.

Monthly Report, Review of Agriculture, Washington, has a letter from Brevet Col. J. Hamilton, dated Raleigh, N. C., in which he says: "The reason that a bott can resist the action of agents administered, is his power of drawing his head to the walls of the stomach by his tentacles."

He claims to resist chloroform, A table-spoonful of chloroform, sprayed by a couple of spoonfuls of any good mastic, will make him let go his hold on the stomach even after having held nearly through. We suppose this must be followed by a purgative.
