Opposition to Impeachment—Butler's Declaration—A New Reconstruction Scheme—New Orleans Riots.

WASHINGTON, February 3.—The impeachment continues to be the absorbing theme of conversation here. That which is below set forth is substantially a correct statement of the facts known to-night. General Butler is reported to have said today to several of his acquaintances who called on him that he is not in favor of any further action by Congress in the matter of impeachment. The proposition did well enough for electioneering purposes, but it would not do for Congress to attempt to carry it out.

There are but twenty-three of the impeachers proper—or those who are actively and energetically working up a case against Mr. Johnson. These members justify the removal of the President upon the higher law theory, and accord in full with Wendell Phillips as to the political necessity of deposing Mr. Johnson.

Many of the political friends of these men, however, admit that, strictly pursuing the legal definition and purport of the language of the Constitution, viz: "Treason, bribery, and other high crimes and misdemeanors," there is no evidence extant that will sustain articles of impeachment, in view of the rule of law that penal statutes must be construed strictly, and that they cannot be extended by their spirit or equity to other offenses than those clearly described and provided for.

But the promoters of the scheme believe that the end sought to be accomplished, justifies the means they have adopted, which consist of a pro forma impeachment by the House, and immediate suspension of Mr. Johnson in the exercise of his official functions. Unless, therefore, it can be found by a previous caucus or committee of noes that there is a majority of the House in favor of this plan, no attempt will be made to adopt articles of impeachment, and the Judiciary Committee will merely report the testimony that shall be taken. Should the number of opponents of impeachment increase in the coming week, in the ratio of their gain last week, the scheme will be abandoned.

GENERAL GRANT AND THE IMPROVEMENT.—It is stated that the Committee on the Judiciary will soon submit General Grant before them for the purpose of obtaining such information from him, as will test his fealty to the President. Should they find him leaning toward his policy so strongly as to forbid the hope that he will desert, it is said the impeachment project will be abandoned; while, on the other hand, if there is reason to believe that he would not actively interfere for the execution of that policy, impeachment will then be prosecuted. The committee have other designs in bringing General Grant before them, which will appear in due time.—World.

SENATOR PATTERSON REQUESTED TO RESIGN. A resolution was introduced into the Senate on January 29, and referred to the committee on Federal Relations, requesting Judge Patterson, United States Senator, to resign. The preamble recites his shameful betrayal of the loyal Union men who gave him their confidence and their votes. It is thought that the resolution will pass the House by a large majority.

The New York Express is responsible for the following statement, which is interesting and important if true: "The Jews in Bombay have been greatly excited by the publication of a pamphlet by their pastor entitled 'The Voice of the Vigilant.' The object of the pamphlet is to persuade the Jews that it is useless to wait any longer for the promised Messiah, as it is Jesus Christ himself who is made known in the New Testament."

THIRTY MEMORIALS SIGNED BY about two thousand persons, praying for the impeachment of the President, have been presented in the House, and laid before the Judiciary committee. The tide is turning, and petitions against the movement are coming in. Mr. Raymond has presented the memorial of Murphy, McCurdy & Warden, and a large number of other business men in the city of New York, remonstrating against movements for the impeachment of the President, and urging the necessity of adopting measures to strengthen public confidence, stay excitement, revive the interests of labor and capital, and promote the peace and prosperity of the country.

Public Schools in Alabama.—MONTGOMERY, Ala., January 31.—The House bill to establish a system of public schools for each shall be separate in each school district, has passed. It is understood that the Legislature will not reconsider its action on the constitutional amendment.
