SACRIFICED.—We are pleased to announce that we have sold 12 boxes of the material for the Morris Manufacturing Company's new mill. The Company purchased the property of the Georgia Mining Company, which was subsequently claimed by the State of Georgia as the property of the Confederacy. It is however, that it will be surrendered at the end of the year. The Company are now spinning new sheets at their Orange Mills, for their rooms in Atlanta, which will now be put up as soon as the present is vacated.

M. H. DIXON.—We are pleased to learn that the North Carolina R. R. Company has accepted the repair and fitting up of the Depot building in this city, which was burned by their enemies. The object is to fit it up for the accommodation of passengers, with a ladies and gentlemen's parlor and eating saloon. The work is being done under the superintendence of George E. Allen, under the direction of Mr. W. H. Dixon, President of the N. C. R. R., and is being paid at the expense of both the N. C. and Morris and Thos. R. Roads, and for the benefit of both.

CHAMBERSBURG.—The colored regiment, which has been here for some weeks, has been recruited and paid off, we hope. Most of them are now in the Eastern part of the State. We have not heard with any exactness where they have sent. Many of them have left wives and children in the Eastern towns and their traps.

Most Friends Murdered.

CHARLOTTE.—As a sign of the times, I send an account of a murder committed in Charlotte on the night of the 21st January, 1867. Mrs. and Mrs. Jane Collins, freed woman, mother and daughter, the former about 50 years and the latter 20 years of age, were living in the rear of a winter-lodge, though not employed by it. They had two small children, one a boy three years old named Jerry, the other a girl two years old named Lucy. They had been married a long time, and were the best of friends, and who is known to have caused the death of the mother? Her son, George Murray, was born in Charlotte, when Jerry and Lucy had married, had broken the news—that George Murray had killed his mother—and had run away to New York, and made him a slave, and had sold him to a master, and killed him. She, however, was too kindly and weak a person to make any remarks. Many of us, however, did not understand that she had been very much about the child; but we all know that those two women had suffered a most mortified death very cruelly.

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
