LETTER FROM WASHINGTON.

Announcement by Authority of the President's Position—Radicalism Jubilant and Temporary Triumphant—Why Stevens Aided the Democrats to Filibuster, Etc.

Correspondence of the Richmond Dispatch.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 29.

The announcement made evidently by authority in the Administration organ of this city, as well as in the Washington correspondence of the Baltimore Sun and other papers of this morning, that the President will not sign the reconstruction bill which passed Congress yesterday, has put an end to all speculation on the score of its fate during the present Congress, and every one is impatiently waiting to know what will be said in the President returning the bill with his objections. Of course there is not the slightest doubt of its passage again over the veto. The Radicals are masters of the situation, and it is not imagined that they or any of them would be moved by what is said in objection to their action. It appears from these positive statements regarding what Mr. Johnson's intentions are, that those who ascribed to him the position of an ultra-tertius resolve to stand by his policy were right in their reckoning. So many different stories have been in circulation of late, and all so positively by parties known to be generally among the best informed, that it was altogether impossible to know upon what to rely. The position taken by Senator Reverdy Johnson has strengthened the Radicals in Congress very much, and will give them strong grounds in reiterated a favorite dogma that President Johnson has proved himself a bad friend to the South. The same charges are made against the Democrats who voted against the bill. With a profession of magnanimity it is declared that should the South meet in the spirit of favor the term of reconstruction come, it will not be long before the disability clause will be removed, and dismemberment stricken out of its provisions. The friends of Thad. Stevens claim that he acted with the minority in filibustering right before last for a purpose which he has achieved. It is not believed now that the first session of the next Congress will be so lengthy one. It would only be delayed in case of imminent impeachment; and just now it is the opinion that enough has been accomplished to do away with the removal of the President; but Butler may create a furor when he takes his seat, and renew the cry for his despatch. No one knows what the day may bring forth.

An act to Abolish Imprisonment for Debt.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of North Carolina, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That from and after the passage of this act, it shall not be lawful to arrest or imprison any person upon any original writ, for debt, assumpion, covenant or any other breach of contract, issuing out of any court of record in this State, or upon any warrant issuing from any Justice of the Peace, nor upon any *copy of witnessdom*, or any process issuing from any court of record, or from any Justice of the Peace in this State.

Sec. 2. Be it further enacted, That all original writs shall only summon the defendant or defendants to be, and appear at the next Term of the Court, to which said writs are returnable: Provided, That if the plaintiff in any action of debt, assumpion, or covenant, shall make oath in writing, that the defendant or defendants are about to remove himself or property beyond the limits of this State, and shall, at the same time, swear to the amount that such person or persons are indebted to him, and that the same is justly due, then the plaintiff shall have a *copy of witnessdom* or *ad satisfactiendum*, or a full warrant to arrest the body of such absconding debtor: Provided further, That if at any time after the issuing of the writ and before execution levied, the plaintiff, his agent or attorney shall make oath before the Clerk of the Court from which the writ is issued, that the defendant is about to leave the State, then the Clerk shall issue an alias writ of *copias ad respondendum*, or *ad satisfactiendum* as the case may be, and the defendant shall be required to give bail.

Sec. 3. Be it further enacted, That all laws and clauses of laws coming in conflict with this Act, be and the same is hereby repealed.

Sec. 4. Be it further enacted, That this Act shall be in force from and after its ratification, ratified this 21st day of February, 1867.
