RECONSTRUCTION—INTERESTING CORRESPONDENCE.

DUNC.

John M. Washkorn, of Texas, has addressed the following letter to Senator Wilson:

WASHINGTON, March 21, 1867.
Sir—On my return home to Texas many questions will be asked as to the extent of the disfranchisement set forth in the reconstruction law passed March 2nd, and after answers made by the supplemental bill. Does the law, as it now reads, disfranchise the rank and file of the soldiers and citizens in the Southern States, who had never taken an oath to support the Constitution of the United States, or is it only applicable to that class of persons who had previously taken that oath and afterwards engaged in the rebellion?

Your interpretation of the law, as understood here, will do much in quieting speculations on the subject, and give many the opportunity of aiding by their suffrage to quiet the country.

To which Senator Wilson replied as follows:

J. M. Washkorn, Esq.:—
My Dear Sir.—In reply to your question, "does the law as it now exists disqualify the rank and file of the soldiers who had never taken an oath to support the Constitution of the United States?" I have to say that it does not disfranchise them. The constitutional amendment disqualifies from holding office certain persons who have taken an oath to support the Constitution of the United States and then engaged in the rebellion, or gave aid and comfort to it. This class of persons are disfranchised, and all other persons are entitled to vote.

These persons are mentioned in the constitutional amendment, so that all persons will know who are disqualified and disfranchised.

MORE LIGHT WANTED.

In the House of Representatives, on Monday, Mr. Donnelly, of Minnesota, introduced a resolution declaring the absolute necessity of education in all parts of the country, and expressing as the sense of the House an earnest hope that the people in the late insurrectionary States, while engaged in reorganizing their several State governments, will insert in their respective State Constitutions a provision requiring the Legislatures to establish and maintain a system of free schools, which shall afford adequate educational advantages to all the people of such States. Passed unanimously.

MARYLAND MEMORIAL.

A minority of the Maryland Legislature, on Monday, caused to be presented in the House of Representatives a memorial which intended to secure such action on the part of Congress as will render Maryland to the control of the Radical party. This memorial is signed by seven members of the State Senate and forty members of the House of Delegates. The whole memorial says in every line, "if we can't rule, we will strive to ruin." They hold up the horrors of New Orleans and Memphis, and say that scenes of a similar character may be enacted in Maryland, unless Congress reaches to the rescue, and gives Maryland a "republican form of government." They know that the Thirty-ninth Congress was utterly unscrupulous when anything stood in the way of a party. They know that the Forty-fifth Congress is composed in great part of the members of the Thirty-ninth, and they expect to accomplish their ends and defeat the will of the people of their State by the mere force and power of numbers. They, therefore, ask Congress not to adjourn until it has hewed down every principle of the rights of a State, interfered in the government of a State which was true throughout all the war, and declared that there does exist here a strong centralized government which claims the right to invade States at will, and overturn their institutions when they stand in the way of a radical idea of loyalty. The memorial was ordered to be printed, but it will no doubt play an important part whenever the Judiciary Committee shall be prepared to report upon the condition of affairs in Maryland, and then it will be quoted as of the highest authority, and all doubting its truth and patriotism will, with the usual Radical fatuity, be set down as traitors and cowards.

REPUBLICAN CRUSADE.

A caucus of the Republican members was held in the hall of the House of Representatives, General Banks in the chair. The sole object of the meeting was to take action concerning future political movements, North and South. After appointing the Congressional committee, consisting of one member from each State, the caucus adjourned.

STEVEN'S CONFISCATION SPEECH.

An omnibus edition of the speech of Mr. Stevens on confiscation has been published in Washington, and will be distributed far and wide. The fact that his infamous scheme of wholesale robbery is esteemed by the leading radicals as the most effective "electoral document" that can be used at this time, is worth in estimating the probability of pacification a thousand times or volumes of speculations.

RADICAL FUN—HIT AT MR. JOHNSON.

Mr. Goveade moved to add the following proviso to the resolution in regard to Mr. Johnson's disqualification:

"Provided, That diplomatic agents shall be permitted to wear any coat, dress, except such as shall be prescribed, and the patterns drawn by the chief tailor of this nation who is now presiding over its destiny."—(Alabama.)

The Speaker ruled promptly, that the amendment was in order, and it was referred to Mr. Corcoran.

Mr. Nodd suggested an amendment that the uniform shall consist of a cocked hat, a long coat with state, and stripes on the tail; leather pantaloons, leather stockings with garters, a la Franklin; leather knee, one side black and one side white, &c. Laughter.
