#### NEWS AND GOSSIP.

#### RECONSTRUCTION—SUGGESTING CORRECTIONS.

John M. Washburn, of Texas, has addressed the following letter to Senator Wilson:

WASHINGTON, March 21, 1867.

Sir—On my return home to Texas many questions will be asked as to the extent of the disfranchisement set forth in the reconstruction law passed March 2nd, and after wards amended by the supplemental act.

Does the law, as it now reads, disfranchise the rank and file of the soldiers and citizens in the Southern States, who had never taken an oath to support the Constitution of the United States, or is it only applicable to that class of persons who had previously taken that oath and afterwards engaged in the rebellion?

Your interpretation of the law, as understood here, will do much in quieting speculations on the subject, and give many the opportunity of aiding by their suffrage to quiet the country.

To which Senator Wilson replied as follows:

My Dear Sir—In reply to your question, does the law as it now exists disfranchise the rank and file of the soldiers who had never taken an oath to support the Constitution of the United States? I have to say that it does not disfranchise them.

The constitutional amendment disqualifies from holding office certain persons who have taken an oath to support the Constitution of the United States and then engaged in the rebellion, or gave aid and comfort to it.

This class of persons are entitled to vote. All other persons are mentioned in the constitutional amendment, so that all persons will know who are disqualified and disfranchised.

#### MORE LIGHT WANTED.

In the House of Representatives, on Monday, Mr. Donnelly, of Minnesota, introduced a resolution declaring the absolute necessity of education in all parts of the country, and expressing the hope that the people in the late insurrectionary States, when engaged in reorganizing their several State governments, will insert in their respective State Constitutions a provision requiring the Legislature to establish and maintain a system of free schools, which shall afford adequate educational advantages to all the people of such States. Passed unanimously.

#### MARYLAND MEMORIALISTS.

A minority of the Maryland Legislature, on Monday, caused to be presented in the House of Representatives a memorial which is intended to secure such action on the part of Congress as will result Maryland to the control of the Radical party. This memorial is signed by seven members of the State Senate and twenty members of the House of Delegates. The whole memorial says in every line, "If we can't get our rights, we'll take them." They hold up the horrors of New Orleans and Memphis, and say that scenes of a similar character may be enacted in Maryland, unless Congress rushes to the rescue, and gives Maryland a "republican form of government." They know that the Thirty-ninth Congress was utterly unscrupulous when anything stood in the way of a State which was torn throughout all the war, and declared that there does exist here a strong centralized government which claims the right to invade States at will, and overturn their institutions, when they stand in the way of a radical idea of loyalty. The memorial was ordered to be printed, but it will no doubt play an important part when over the Judiciary Committee shall be prepared to report upon the condition of affairs in Maryland, and then it will be quoted as of the highest authority, and all doubting its truth and patriotism will, with the usual Radical frenzy, be set down as traitors and copperheads.

#### REPUBLICAN CRUCES.

A caucus of the Republican members was held in the hall of the House of Representatives, on Monday, to elect a committee to prepare a memorial to Congress, and to take action concerning future political movements, North and South. After appointing the Congressional committee, consisting of one member from each State, the caucus adjourned.

#### STERNER'S COMPLICATION SPEECH.

An immense edition of the speech of Mr. Steiwer on confirmation has been published in Washington, and will be distributed free of charge to the leading radicals in the House of Representatives. The speech is a masterpiece of "electrotypical" document, and can be used at this time, in view of the probability of pacification, a thousand the cities or volumes of speculations.

#### RADICAL FRY—HIT AT MR. JOHNSON.

Mr. Corvode moved to add the following words to the resolution in regard to Michigan (from):

"Resolved, That diplomatic agents shall not be permitted to wear any court dress except such as shall be prescribed and the patterns drawn by the chief tailor of this nation who is now presiding over its destinies." (laughter.)

The Speaker ruled, promptly, that the amendment was not in order, and it was returned to Mr. Corvode.

Mr. Noell suggested an amendment to the resolution that consist of a cocked hat, looped up with an American eagle; a white tail coat with stars and stripes on the tail; buttoned pantaloons; clashing yellow stockings; with gaiters, a la Franklin; a black vest, one side black and one side white; and (laughter.)

\$300 REWARD!

A Proclamation by His Excellency, Jonathan Worth, Governor of North Carolina.

WHEREAS IT HAS BEEN REPRESENTED to me that J. Q. BRYANT, late of the County of Wake in said State, stands charged with the murder of one Wiley Lane, late of said County and State, and that said Bryant is a fugitive from justice.

NOW THEREFORE, in order that the said Bryant may be arrested and brought to justice for the said alleged murder, I, Jonathan Worth, Governor of said State, do issue this my proclamation, offering the reward of THREE HUNDRED DOLLARS for his apprehension and delivery to the Sheriff of Wake County.

In witness whereof, His Excellency, JONATHAN WORTH, Governor of said State, has hereunto set his hand and caused the Great Seal of the State to be affixed, Done at the City of Raleigh, this 22nd day of February, A. D. 1867.
