MESSES. BUTLER AND BINGHAM,

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES, MARCH 26.

Mr. Butler (Mass.) rose to a personal ex-
planation, called attention to the debate
between himself and Mr. Bingham a day or
two ago, and said that he had laid upon
members' desks a printed sheet, showing
the report of Mr. Bingham's remarks as they
appeared in the *Globe*, and as they were
really uttered, as appeared from the report
of the committee.

The report as published, did him (Butler) injustice, and he did not envy
any one who could in the cool of the even-
ing sit down and deliberately pass a speech
that could not be answered, and put it im-
mediately preceding what purported to be
an answer. Mr. Butler then proceeded to
refer again to the trial of the conspirators in
the assassination of Mr. Lincoln, and he re-
iterated the statement heretofore made, that
the evidence did not justify the execution of
Mr. Surratt.

He had examined it with great care, and
the view he expressed the other day as to
the innocence of Mrs. Surratt. It was no
spasmodic thought of his but was made up
after clear and calm deliberation. In his
speech the gentleman from Ohio (Mr. Bingham) had
said he was the advocate of the United
States. He was the special Judge Advo-
cate of the United States, and as such it be-
came his duty to care for the interests of the
prisoner, and to present all evidence bearing
upon the case. He knew that the Judge Ad-
vocate General of the United States was
sitting at the trial daily as the recorder, and
that he had the control of all the testi-
mony.

Mr. Butler asked the privilege of replying,
but objection was made on all sides.

Mr. Ward, of New York, said in view of
what had taken place, he asked leave to in-
troduce a resolution declaring that it had
been asserted in a speech Boston, by an
ex-Cabinet minister, that Mrs. Surratt had
been unjustly hung; and that the same
having been made upon the Bar of the Court
of Appeals, a committee should be appointed to
investigate the matter.

Mr. Stevens, of Pennsylvania, objected
to this controversy should not continue any
longer, and it was one that should never
have been brought into the House.
