### TYPOGRAPHICAL ERRORS.

In a recent lecture delivered in New York city, Mr. Wm. L. Stone gave the following amusing instances of what are known as typographical errors:

In the early stages of the art of printing, errors were far more numerous than in those of modern execution. It was then very common for a volume of ordinary size to contain page upon page of errors at the close. One of the most remarkable instances of this kind, was the curious treatise of Edward Leigh on "Beligion and Learning," published in 1536. At the close of the work were three folio pages of corrections in very minute type. It is a singular fact that the edition of the Latin Vulgate by Pope Sixtus V., although carefully supervised, shed not a sheet, by his Holiness, has ever remained without a rival in typographical inaccuracy. Still more curious was it a fact that the Pope, in the plenitude of his pontifical infallibility, prefixed to the first volume a bull of excommunication against any and every printer, who, in reprinting the work, should ever make any alteration in the text. Among instances of typographical errors the lecturer gave the following: A lad in a printing office, who knew more about type-setting than he did of the Greek mythology, in looking over a poem they were printing, came upon the name of *Heads*, one of the lady divinities of the lower world, occurring in a line like this: "She shall reign the *Heads* of the deep hell." The boy, thinking he had discovered an error, ran to the master printer, and inquired eagerly whether there was an "E" in it. "Why, no, you blockhead," was the reply. Away went the boy to the press-room and extracted the objectionable letter. But fancy the horror of both poet and publisher when the poem appeared with the line: "She shall reign the *Head* of the deep hell." This, however, was not so bad in the manner in which the printers treated Miss Landon. In speaking of it she says: "And when I had written it full blown roses, the nasty things made it full blown noses." Benjamin Franklin once putting to press a form of the Common Prayer, the letter in the following passage dropped out "unperceived by him." "We shall all be changed in the twinkling of an eye." When the book appeared, to the horror of the devout worshippers, the passage read: "We shall all be changed in the twinkling of an eye." Franklin has been suspected of having done this intentionally, but it appears to me without good reason. But, after all, when it is considered how many separate and minute pieces of metal a book form or the pages of a newspaper are composed, the wonder is that the errors of the Press are not far more numerous than they are. A single page of one of our largest papers cannot contain less than 315,000 separate pieces of metal, each of which must be nicely adjusted in its own proper place, or error and confusion will ensue.

### FEMALE SUFFRAGE.

The bill conferring a suffrage on females in religious societies have passed the Senate, one of the clearest signs who favored it predicts that it is the beginning of suffrage on political affairs, and quotes the remarks of a learned judge who recently said that he permitted the wife to make a servant of her husband—paying him wages, and allowing him what, in her judgment, should be a reasonable support. Why, man, the husband is always the servant of the wife, only the parties don't always know it. The wife rules supreme as the rule, and where she don't it is an exception to the rule. The husband labors from eight to twenty hours a day down town, and up, to make his wife mistress of the dwelling, where he gets, at most, three meals a day and a night's lodging. If he is able, she gets a pew in church, her equipage, her opera box, her town house and country house, her silks and satins and elegant attire—the very best the Old World and new World—and the husband, poor soul, has the privilege of sleeping at night, with sometimes a candle lecture thrown in, and, perchance, shot and as egg in the morning. But it seems this is not enough—Molly Dolly Adelaide demands the right of suffrage, and who dare say nay to her demand? It is now given to the South to all Africa, young as old of the masculine sex, and why not to our darling wives, upon whom we lavishly the labor of our lives to make them our boss while we live, and to leave them all we can care when we die? Yes, what is this begun in "religious societies" will end in a common rostrum, a common ballot box and a common row. We live in the progressive age. Let us make the most of it. Pegasus is no longer a myth but a very African and the Goddess of Liberty, such with the ball in her hand, even if it is necessary to win it with the bullet.—*N. Y. Herald.*

## IMPORTANT ORDER BY GENERAL SICKLES.

HEADQUARTERS, SECOND MILITARY DISTRICT, Charleston, S. C., April 11, 1867.

The general destination prevailing among the population of this military district cannot be relieved without affording means for the development of their industrial resources. The nature and extent of the destitution demand extraordinary measures. The people are borne down by a heavy burden of debt; the crops of grain and garden produce failed last year; many families have been deprived of shelter; many more need food and clothing; needful implements and auxiliaries of husbandry are very scarce; the laboring population in numerous localities are threatened with starvation unless supplied with food by the government of the United States; the inability of a large portion of the people to pay taxes leaves the local authorities without adequate means of relief, and the gravity of the situation is increased by the general disposition shown by creditors to enforce upon an impoverished people the immediate collection of all claims. To suffer all this to go on without restraint or remedy is to sacrifice the general good of the people. A violation of this order will render the offender amenable to trial and punishment by military commission. Whichever sounding or killing proof result from the use of such weapons, stout of the party carrying or concealing a deadly weapon shall be deemed evidence of a felonious attempt to take the life of the injured person.

**Thirteenth.** The order heretofore issued in this military department prohibiting the punishment of crimes and offenses by whipping, branding, flogging, stocks, pillory or other corporal punishment, is in force and will be obeyed by all persons.

**Fourteenth.** The punishment of death in certain cases of burglary and larceny imposed by the existing laws of the provisional governments in this military district is abolished. Any person convicted of burglary or larceny, when the property stolen is of the value of \$25, shall be punished by imprisonment at hard labor for a term not exceeding ten years nor less than two years, in the discretion of the court having jurisdiction thereof. Larceny, when the value thereof is less than \$25, shall be punished by imprisonment at hard labor for a term not exceeding one year in the discretion of the court.

**Fifteenth.** The Governors of North and South Carolina shall have authority within their jurisdiction respectively to retrieve or pardon any person convicted and sentenced by a civil court and to remit fines and penalties.

**Sixteenth.** Nothing in this order shall be construed to restrain or prevent the operation of proceedings in bankruptcy in accordance with the acts of Congress in such cases made and provided for, with the collection of any taxes, impost, excise or charge levied by authority of the United States or of the provisional governments of North and South Carolina; but no imprisonment for over due taxes shall be allowed, nor shall this order or any law of the provisional governments of North and South Carolina operate to deny to minor children control of age, or their legal representatives, not to suspend as to them, any right of action, remedy or proceeding against executors, administrators, trustees, guardians, masters or clerks of equity courts, or other officers or persons holding a fiduciary relation to the parties or the subject matter of the action or proceeding.

**Seventeenth.** Any law or ordinance heretofore in force in North or South Carolina inconsistent with the provisions of this General Order is hereby suspended and declared inoperative.
