FROM THE RICHMOND EXAMINER.

THE TRIBUNE ANSWERED.

The New York Tribune quotes with much patronizing approval a late editorial in this paper, and appends the following comment:—

"Let us suppose now the editor of the Examiner before an assembly of blacks, endeavoring to persuade them to vote for his ticket, and one of our negroes shall see fit to propound to him these questions:—

"You say, sir, that we ought to vote together."

"Why do you say so? Do you mean that we should vote only by our voting with you? Why should I vote, rather, with you than with him?"

"You call upon the Conservative ticket, and urge its support on that ground. Very well; we are Conservatives—we have recently been blessed with freedom and freedom of conscience, and we are anxious to secure, to perpetuate them. Will you show us how and why voting as you wish will achieve our end?"

"In two years? If not, what has political change?"

"You indicate hostility to the Radicals as the basis of your political action. Please state frankly whether we do not, under G. D. one opportunity to vote as to Radicals and Radicals? But for their shouting, we are about to make as?

In short, do you not detest the Radicals mainly because they have made us free, and constrained us to seek our votes?"

Wouldn't the Editor be somewhat bothered to straighten out answers to these questions?"

Not in the least. We answer them here, with the utmost frankness. He represents the colored people as asking—

1. Why should I vote rather with you than with him?

"Because we regard, and we presume the Tribune regards, the white people of the South as the most intelligent, better acquainted with the principles of government, better placed in its administration, more conservative—in every way the better depositaries of the trust of selecting rulers and representatives than the blacks are at this time. So that we think if there is a *rather* in the case, we think it not too great an assumption to claim that it should rest in favor of the whites than the blacks."

That this is the conclusion of the most extreme Radicals, may be regarded by the Tribune as fortifying our position. We, therefore, call the editor's attention to the fact that everywhere throughout the South, the Republican whites assume to guide the negroes, and to whose account is that absolute liberty of any approach to it. Thus, in the late Convention, in this city, although the negroes outnumbered the whites more than twenty to one, the whites filled the offices, arranged the entire programme, prepared the address—in a word, managed every detail of the movement.

2. Will you show us how and why voting as you wish will achieve our end, (conservation.)

Very plainly. If conservatism means simply the opposite of Radicalism, as it is usually defined in politics, it is easy to see that voting with the Radicals cannot insure Conservative success. But the matter is too important, we concede, to be bound with the myth of a definition, and we meet our inquirer on the broad field. We can answer this question only by defining conservatism as a phrase of politics. What is that conservatism?

It is the conserving of legal and political rights to the citizen, and to the State; the maintenance of the principles of good government; the support in this country, of the Constitution, which all agree to be the Law and Right of the government.

If any party in the Union should labor for this conservatism, it is the colored people, for the obvious reason that they are a minority, and that they are inferior in many respects to the whites. A majority can defend itself with its power—a minority only with law, which is conservatism. A favored class, which also has the numerical strength, is in no danger of losing its privileges while united. An inferior class, however united, cannot preserve its rights except by conservatism.

Now, we ask the Tribune, in all candor, whether tried by the standard of private right, State right or the authority of the Constitution? Is it the party that suspends *Abbas corpus* or that which opposes that suspension? Is it the party that taxes without representation, or that which opposes such taxation?

Is it the party which deprives a State of its equal rights in the Senate, without its consent, or the party which denounces that deprivation?

Is it the party which substitutes military for civil government in a third of the Union, or the party which opposes it?

Is it the party which denies the common law right of trial by jury, or the party which upholds it?

Is it the party which imposes taxes unequal and unfair, or that which demands that taxation shall be equal and uniform?

Is it the party which threatens confiscation, or that which denounces it?

All these, and the questions might be extended greatly, are simple questions, to which each man, white and black, can give but one answer.

3. Please state frankly, whether we do, under God, owe our opportunity to vote at all to Radicals and Radicals?

Frankly, we do not, in any sense that should entitle Radicals or Radicalism to your gratitude.

The motive of an act is the measure of its merit.

No Christian believes that he can be saved except through the crucifixion of Christ. Now a Roman ruler crucified Christ. The Tribune would conclude, therefore, that every Christian who is saved is indebted to him for his salvation.

This reasoning is identical with that which the Tribune applies to the Republicans, by the name of 'conservatism'.

We say, that, unless an honest desire to maintain the rights of the blacks inspired that conservatism, they deserve no more credit for it than does Pontius Pilate for the salvation of mankind. But that no such honest desire existed is demonstrable from the fact that, for many years, the Republican party in the Northern States, and here referred to as the Radicals, and it was for their sake, that, in the majority of cases, those who voted for them to the present hour? Nothing can more clearly prove that some other than an honest motive inspired the extravagance alluded to, and we presume there is not a man, woman or child in the United States, who does not know that that motive was, as was simply to build up a Radical party, while and black, can give but one answer.

The Tribune has never been called on to consider the negro, 'saved from a party' advantage, without repudiating all those notions of equality which they find it convenient to announce to mass-meetings of
