THE SITUATION. The present state of the country, both North and South, calls for the efforts of the wisest and most virtuous statesmen of the land, to protect and preserve our republican institutions from utter overthrow. Republican institutions are unsafe in the hands of the illiterate controlling leaders of the so-called Republican or Radical party. Like the controlling leaders of progressive Democracy, they are potent to see down, but impotent to build up. Indeed, we honestly believe that Republican institutions are unsafe in the hands of any party, inflated with success, puffed up with pride and vaunting, with ideas of mere partisan greatness, which ignore that the safety and true glory of the Republic lie in the hands of the whole people. Hence our opposition to Southern people connecting themselves with any of the parties in existence. The country needs the fostering hand of a new party, not inflated by new ideas, new principles, untried and dubious—the emanations of an ungodly philosophy or a phrenzied fanaticism—but a party basing its foundation upon the tried and well tested principles of old English and American liberty, adapted, if you please, to sound ideas of real development and progress, untried, like pure honey, of all wax and fermentation. It is a genuine Republican party, bound with cords of steel to a Constitutional Union, a steadfast friend of liberty and progress, and which will not compromise its patriotic devotion to the interests of the whole country and the whole people for the lower and baser purposes of partyism.

The writers are also responsible for their contents, and our publication of them does not commit us either for or against the views advanced. We repeat the suggestion, heretofore made, that every Trustee should be present at the meeting, to bear his share of the responsibility in whatever may be done. If ever the Trustees intend to discharge their high trust with fidelity and promptness, this is the time to do it.

Specially to all this, as a disciplinarian, and no small item, his domestic conduct is unimpeachable. Our correspondent is mistaken in regarding the resignation of Dr. Deems. He is a native of Maryland, but regards himself as a citizen of the State, having been in it nearly a quarter of a century.
