A CAPITAL SPEECH.

General George W. Meade made a capital speech at Chapel Hill the other day, of which the following was the conclusion. It is one of the bravest Northern soldiers who speaks and thus pleads for mercy to the conquered and peace to the country:

"What is no one to be punished? I punished? Does that question emanate from a human heart, or is it an inspiration from a fiend of hell? Punished? Why, my countrymen, have in the history of civilized warfare ever been punished? I have killed upon the conquered people as they were ordered by our countrymen of the South. Towns and cities sacked and burned. Whole districts charred and desolated as if by the demon of destruction, and millions who were reared in affluence reduced by the shock of war to pauper and want. But is no one to die? Is no blood to be shed? Alas! No! No one to die? Is the life of the hundred thousand graves around which the melancholy cypress stands, as spectral sentinels, mourning over the victims of a fallen cause, as over the heroes of a noble blood. Five hundred thousand graves, the sad monuments of the error of a heroic but deluded people. Five hundred thousand Southern homes are draped in mourning for the loved ones who slumber in defeat beneath the crimson soil. Five hundred thousand Southern homes are desolate, and the night wind as it sweeps across an hundred-straggled battle-field, is still burdened with the groans and anguish and the sighs of despair which come from the graves of those who died in a lost and mistaken cause. Five hundred thousand Southern mothers, widows, orphans, are the living monuments of the blight of fratricidal war. And who asks for vengeance more than this? What demon in human shape cries for blood? My countrymen, the very earth is still red with brothers' blood, by brothers shed. Oh, then, let us staunch the crimson tide as it ebbs away. And our own dead heroes, what of them? The laurel blooms upon their graves—the stars banner, and the eagle which nobly died, waves over them. Their bodies are dead, but their names and glorious deeds will live forever. They died for the Union they loved, for the flag they adored. Oh, my countrymen, let it not be said that they died in vain! But upon their tombs, to consecrate their deeds, let the temple of the Union be restored. And let it be said, that the noblest of men, in his own country, and aware that our free Constitutions shall endure forever."

The voice of Connecticut and Kentucky will be no school in thunder tones by the great central States, until the Southern States are emancipated from negro domination, and restored to their rightful places as equals and sisters in the great federal family. (Applause.) Then will the liberties of the people again be shielded by the guarantees of the constitution, and the Union be, as it was designed to be, perpetual. In our victory we called upon all friends of good government to rejoice with us. We indulge in no unmanly exultations over our antagonists—the mass of them were as honest, and patriotic in their aims as we are in ours. All of us, I trust, desire to bury the alienations and bitterness of the past, and to pledge ourselves anew to cherish, as our most precious possession, the Federal Union and Constitution, according to the principles and in the spirit of our fathers. We have a great State here, with immeasurable resources to develop, and a glorious country from ocean to ocean, embracing the expanse of a continent, with every natural advantage a country could possess. Let us devote ourselves for the cause of pure government, here, and shape our policy so as to secure peace, order, civil government, and constitutional liberty to every part of our country. (Applause.) I will not prolong these remarks further, and you must now allow me to bid you good night. (Applause.)
