THE NEGRO IN THE ELECTIONS.

The African idol of the Radical party has played a very important part in the election held on Tuesday. Its effect upon the negro has been different from that counted upon by the managers of the Republican party. They relied upon valuable assistance through their appeals in behalf of the blacks, but have not only been disappointed, but even repudiated.

In New Jersey the Republicans in the Legislature voted in favor of establishing negro suffrage in the State. The party subsequently met in Convention at Trenton, and decided that hereafter they would labor for suffrage for the blacks until it was established, not only in their State, but in the South.

In the State of Kansas, the author of Radicalism, the States which has been property termed the "child" of the Republican party, they submitted two amendments to the constitution, one providing for negro suffrage, and one for female suffrage. The returns received from that State show an overwhelming repudiation of both of those propositions by the people. Of all the defeats which the Radicals have experienced this of the State of Kansas is the severest. The slavery agitation in that section, when Kansas was a Territory, gave birth to the Republican party, under the excitement which attended that agitation, and through the assistance of the New England aid societies the Territory was seized by the most bitter stamp of Radicalism. Its population was thus made up of the very class of men who were supposed to be the most persistent on all Radical issues. But when asked to record their approval of the cardinal plank of the party, and thus ratify the action of Congress in enjoining negro suffrage on the South, they revolted, and refused to bow their knees to the African race.

In Minnesota, colored suffrage was also submitted to the people as an amendment to their constitution. There, as in New Jersey, Ohio and Kansas, the people came forward and pronounced their condemnation of the proposition by a majority against it sufficiently large to leave no mistake as to their meaning.

In Wisconsin, the Republican party adopted, as one of the planks in its platform, the same negro-suffrage policy. The result that the people have risen in their might, and the indications are that they have repudiated the party and wheeled that State into line in the Democratic column. The Republican party has been considered as successful in the States as Vermont.

Here in New York, this late dominant party decreed in the Constitutional Convention that the negroes should be placed on equality at the polls and in the jury box with the whites. Their nominating Conventions pledged the party to carry out that decree and insist upon its establishment in all other sections of the State. The election has been held, and the people called upon to give their verdict upon that question. The result is now seen by the Republican majority of thirteen thousand of last year being swept away, and a Democratic majority of from thirty to forty thousand sustained. Thus in every section of the country where this question has been submitted, the people have repudiated the party which insisted upon the negroes being placed on equality at the polls and in the jury box with the whites.
