RADICAL POLICY HOSTILE TO COTTON CULTURE.

In the recent delete in the Senate upon the Home bill repealing the cotton tax, Mr. Morrill, who, as chairmen of the Committee on Ways and Means of the House, was the author of the tax, undended to excuse it by asserting that cotton was still produced in the South at a very remanerative rate, though it does not sell for as much as in production costs, by at least thirty per cent. He alleged that cotton was now worth as much to the producer as it was in 1859-'60, when it was sold at about the same price which it brings now. Cotton cound be raised at a profit, in 1859, at eleven conts a pound, gold, and it brings a bring price now.—The culture is equally millurerative to the planter, and, consequently, it must have a tax equal to twenty five per cent, upon its value.

Such are the statements made in Congress

Such are the statements made in Congress, and such are the arguments used by Radical leaders for the deception of the people.

Mr. Morrill excludes from consideration the fact that the cost of producing the cotton is twice as great now as it was in 1859.

Every item that goes into the aggregate expense of the production of cotton costs twice as much now as it did in 1859. Even members of Congress were prompt to double their pay upon the assumption, that by their legislation they had depreciated the currency and enhanced the cost of living to such rate that they must have double pay.

But the cost of producing cotton is much nore than double what it was in 1859.— The cost of labor, even where it can be procured at all, is now much greater than la-bor employed in like culture anywhere in the world. The cost of the labor of slaves in 1859 was estimated at sixty dollars a year per nead. Now the same labor costs three hundred dollars a head. But in fact, the planter owning slaves was at no ex-pense whatever for his labor, for the in-crease of the number of the slaves in families much more than compensated for the cost of their support. Thus the cost of labor in 1859 was little, and now it is three hundred dollars a head annually. How are we ever to have a just and wise system of national raxation under the lead of such statisticians as Mr. Morrill?

Mr. Sprague, in the same debate, declared that the cotton culture and the domestic numbeture of cotton fabrics were nearly at an end in this country; that the culture of Sea island or long staple cotton must cease in our cotton region; and the im-provements, both in culture and machinery, abroad, had brought into market cotton goods at low prices that were equal to the fairies made from our best Sea island cot-

But reinous as this competition is now to our product and manufacture, it must become still more destructive. We find, from statements in English papers, that cotton of the best staple can be procured for Manches-ter mills at aixpence a pound. Some say that it will ultimately role at fourpence half penny.

The British cotton manufacturers aim to send their fabrics to the uttermost parts of the earth at prices much less than it would cost to spin them on the spot. No country had supplied the English cotton spinners as cheaply as did the Southern States. But that is all changed, and, as if to prevent the possible product of cotton in this country at a price competing with that of other countries, Mr. Morrill and others of our Senstorial financiers argue that it must be subject to an internal excise of twenty five

per cent.

If the United States is to be a cottongrowing country; if we are to supply the
European cotton-spinners again, as we did
formerly, it must be at a very low price of
the staple—as low as it was prior to the late
civil war; as low as it ean be produced in
India; and it is certain that this cannot be
done while Congress puts a vindictive tax
on the product, and, at the same time, disorganizes and demoralizes the only labor
that can be employed in the cotton culture.
