THE RESULT OF IMPROVEMENT.

The Times would laugh in our face if we should assume that a single Republican Senator would vote to depose President Johnson for any other reason than to transform a neutral in a Radical engine next November. The Times proclaims the absurdity of such an assumption when it bounds on the Senate to register for reasons other than as a outside of the affairs to which the President's defence is confined before the body which has the power to remove him.

CARPET-BAGGERS IN THE SENATE CHAMBER.

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The Bankrupt Act.

We have been requested to publish the Bankrupt Act, and to give a full and complete explanation of its provisions, and to show how it affects the interests of creditors and debtors.

When the petition is filed, the court is required to appoint a receiver, who shall take possession of the estate, and shall inventory and sell the assets, and shall distribute the proceeds to the creditors.

It is provided that the receiver shall have the power to sue and be sued, and that he shall be bound to account to the court for his conduct.

It is also provided that the receiver shall have the power to execute any power of sale, and that he shall be bound to execute any power of sale.
