THE REPUBLICAN PARTY DAGUEREEOTYPED BY A RADICAL AND
"LIVED."

Republicans elected Andrew Johnson for party success; they imposed him for party success; and since the day the scepter of power came into their hands, they have worked for party success rather than the nation's life.

While they have deceived the people with the cry of Constitutional amendments, laying, negro suffrage, and impeachment, they have shown themselves disloyal to the grand principles of our government, by their attempts to drag down the Federal Constitution to their low platform, to force negro suffrage on the South while repudiating it in the Northern States; and after proving the President guilty of high crimes and misdemeanors, strangled impeachment with their own hands.

And now the handwriting on the wall warns them that they are "weighed in the balance and found wanting." The Republican party stands to-day with its ranks broken, divided, discredited, blasted; and the scepter of power has passed from it forever. But this is no cause of sorrow, for the sooner this party is scattered to the four winds of heaven, the sooner will the scales fall from the eyes of the people, and they will see that their leaders have been but blind leaders of the blind.

Jurian Bentham says: "The people cannot be too distrustful of their rulers." When the American people hear that men and parties are nothing unless based on principle, and that whether under a Republican or Democratic dynasty, we have the same results they will awoke to the responsibility of self-government.

As we turn over the pages of history we see how nations, groaning under taxation, ignorance and poverty, have been debased, blinded and destroyed, without dreaming that we ourselves, are to day the thoughts, victims of selfish and crazy rulers who think only of their own aggrandizement. As Rome, with fetes and games, great holidays and deadly combats between men and beasts, with gladiatorial exhibitions, so crowded amphitheaters, turned the people's thought from their wrongs—so do our rulers, with caucuses, conventions, campaigns, impeachment trials and the coarse brutality of the press and politicians, among the people, degrade the public taste, and destroy the virtue of the nation. Unthinking readers inflame the North against rebellion, and damn every man who dares put in a plea for justice and mercy to the South, with the unmeaning name of "copperhead." To rouse the people's wrath they point them to the bones of their brave sires and sons bleaching on all those Southern plains, torturing them with their own shades they built that sepulchre where our brave dead now sleep. The chain that held the black boy in the overlades of Florida and the slave child in a New Orleans market was fastened round their neck by New England's sons and daughters. Through our arteries and sinewous the land of orange groves and flowers lies bleeding and desolate today. Blame not the South, but our own constitutions, creeds and codes.

But while we ended with the sword a slavery of brute force, and overthrew the Southern oligarchy, by banishing legislation we have substituted another form of slavery, in our own system of finance. In our national debt and taxation, we have placed the whole labor of the country at the mercy of a monied aristocracy of bonds, bondholders, and land monopolists. Having just escaped from the yoke of 400,000 slaveholders, we are about to bow our necks to the yoke of 400,000 bondholders. Flushed with conquest, these "High Art Swindlers" have brought up the nation's virtue and choked our prophets who have dared to speak.

NEW YORK THE CENTRE OF THE WORLD.

Everything points to the future greatness and controlling influence of New York as the centre of the world. The rapid development of commerce and intercourse with the nations of Europe on one hand, and with the teeming populations of Asia on the other, will make the United States the highway of trade for both the Eastern and Western Hemispheres. Within two years one Pacific railroad at least will be completed, and in the course of a few years several others. The West and a large part of the most valuable trade with China and the other countries of Eastern Asia both for ourselves and Europe will pass across the American Continent, and New York will be the gateway of ingress and egress on this side, as San Francisco will be on the other side. The time from Europe to China this way will be but little over a month. Then we shall soon have instant telegraphic communication with Asia by way of the Atlantic cable, with Europe through the Atlantic cable. In fact, it is impossible to imagine more wonderful results. What most flourishes the powers of these courts and the world is New York, consequently, is destined to be the greatest city on the globe and the model and intellect of the world. We shall see, too, great changes in the cities of the world. The island will be covered from the bottom to the top with dwellings, with population like Park will be surrounded by palatial residences and terraces; Washington Heights will be the site of magnificent villas, and the centre of financial business and banking will leave the cramped walls of Wall street and be established around the City Park, City Hall and new Post Office. These, however, are but a few of the works and vast improvements we may expect within the life-time of the present generation. Our citizens and the people of the United States may well look with pride upon the grand future of this beautiful metropolis; for it is bound to eclipse all the cities of ancient or modern times.—N. Y. Herald.
