If any one of our readers desires to see how truly consistent and honest the Rev. George William Welker is, let him call to mind his celebrated war speech delivered at the great dinner given by that now truly loyal citizen and son-in-law of brother Welker, Wm. McRae, Esq., and contrast it with his speeches made and published in the late Constitutional Convention. This does not satisfy him, we most solemnly urge our friends to get a copy of the preamble and resolutions drafted by him and passed by a public meeting held at Coble's school-house in July, 1863, if we mistake not, and compare them with the Police Bill, so-called, he has introduced into the Senate. This infamous bill is by far more unconstitutional and tyrannical than any bill ever introduced in the Confederate Congress, is the darkest and most despotistic day of the late war, all of which Holden and Welker denounce as being both unconstitutional and tyrannical in the extreme. But now behold the change, Holden, the negro Governor still, calls for a *Picked, Partisan, Pensioned Police*, in time of peace, to be organized, armed and equipped, and designated by a badge of honor and authority, at the expense of the State, and placed under the command and at the disposal of his royal highness King William the 1st, of the Scallawags. The message is no sooner read than behind the greatest defiance of the Constitution, civil and religious liberty in 1863, the Reverend George William Welker, makes haste to devise and introduce the infamous, tyrannical and unconstitutional Picked, Partisan, Pensioned Police Bill, carefully read and contrasted with the Constitution and the preamble and resolutions passed at Coble's school-house, if every honest and intelligent man who reads and carefully contrasts them does not honest come to the conclusion that the Reverend gentleman above named is a knave or a fool, then we are mistaken. And if he heard this man speak at the dinner given by Wm. McRae, as many ladies and gentlemen of high character and responsibility, did, we incline to the opinion it will not take him long to decide as to which of the two classes the Reverend gentleman belongs.

The latest purpose of the Radical party to arm the negroes of the South is so fraught with danger that some even of the newly admitted Representatives of the South have raised their voices against the monstrous design. Mr. Boyden, a member from North Carolina, in the course of a recent debate, depicted, in the following language, the mischiefs which would inevitably attend this arming of the negroes:

"Mr. Speaker, I am grieved at the condition of the country. It is proposed to send arms to North Carolina that the people may use them against each other. From God, we cannot afford to fight each other. Keep away your arms, do nothing to irritate our people, but do everything in your power to assuage and heal the excitement there; we want no arms. I warn the South if arms are sent there we will be mad; we cannot live there. If we send anything in the way of arms, in God's name, and an arm of the United States there, but it will be neighbor against neighbor. There never was a more mischievous measure than the proposition to arm one class of our people against another."

But with their usual disregard of free speech, as soon as it was discovered that Mr. Boyden was opposed to this revolutionary measure, the Radicals effectively closed his mouth. Mr. Bowtell thought him out of order in speaking against this measure, though Mr. Strode had been permitted to advocate it, and the facile Coxey accordingly sustained Mr. Bowtell, and administered the gape to Mr. Boyden.

The purpose of the Radical party appears to be that the people sent some arms to the dangers which actually threatened their liberties. The same is to be placed in the hands of Southern negroes intended by the Radicals to be used not against the South alone, but also against the negroes of the North. If the purpose of the Radicals is to distribute arms for the preservation of liberty, why do they not arm the white men of the South, instead of the negroes of the South?

Their purpose in revolution and negro supremacy as a means of successful revolution. They have lost the confidence of the white man, and seek to win that of the negro. They cannot rely upon white troops, and they propose to arm a band of black janissaries, to be maintained by taxes levied upon the white race, and kept in pay as a means of trampling the superior race under foot. Their designs can no longer be concealed, if the people of the North awake to a sense of their danger, and secure their threatened liberties by electing and insuring into office as guardians of the Constitution the much-hated Seymour and Blair. — *Louisville Courier.*

An Important Radical Scheme.—An important Radical movement was disclosed here to day, by which it is proposed to cast the entire electoral vote of the South for Grant and Colfax. The independent Radicals have got up a plan to have Prof. Schenck, of the South, chosen to the Presidential election in the mode which South Carolina exercised anterior to the war. Even now Legislatures in almost this fall with that important view, it will be seen how easily a master it will be to secure them by fraud and violence; but beyond this, the unfeeling master is well aware that the Legislatures in the South will choose the electors.
