MR. SEYMOUR'S LETTER OF ACCEPTANCE—COMMENTS OF THE RADICAL LEADERSHIP.

He gives prominence to the fact that one of the chief leaders of the Republicans, Mr. H. L. Bulwer, of the City of Raleigh, in the county of Wake, and State of North Carolina, has been duly organized under and according to the requirements of the constitution of the United States, and the National Committee, seconded by a pledge of United States bonds, and to provide for the circulation and redemption thereof," approved June 3d, 1868, in accordance with all the provisions of said Act, requiring him to be admitted without awaiting the arrival of the bill.

Now, Governor J. Island H. Bulwer, Comptroller of the Currency, and member of the State Executive Council of the City of Raleigh, in the county of Wake, and State of North Carolina, is authorized to commence the business of Banking under the act aforesaid, with full power to issue and seal off, throughout the day of June, 1868.

In effect, H. L. Bulwer is Comptroller of the Currency.
