NOMINATING CONVENTION OF FIFTH DISTRICT.

GREENSBORO, N. C., Sept. 8, 1868.

The Delegates appointed by the different

counties of the Fifth Congressional District

met in the Odd Fellows Hall.

The meeting was called to order by Gen.

A. M. Scales, who after a few remarks

moved that Ralph Gorrell, Esq., be called to the Chair.

On taking the chair, Mr. Gorrell, delivered a short, but forcible address.

On motion of S. P. Hill, Esq., G. M.

Mathews, of Fayetteville, and Jas. W. Albright,

of Guilford, were appointed Secretaries.

Upon a call by counties, delegates were

ascertained to be present from all the coun-

ties except Surry and Bladen.

On motion of S. P. Hill, a Committee of

one from each County was appointed, to

suggest suitable names for Elector on the

Presidential Ticket and for candidate for

Congress of this District. The following

gentlemen were appointed: Alsmans, Col.

A. McAllister; Caswell, Hon. John

Kerr; Davidson, C. F. Lowe; Person, W.

H. Smith; Guilford, D. F. Caldwell; For-

sythe, G. M. Mathews; Stokes, Sedgwick Ad-

ams; Randolph, J. F. Rush; Rockingham,

Gen. A. M. Scales.

While the Committee was out the meet-

ing was addressed by S. P. Hill, Thos. Ruf-

fin, Jr., Hon. J. B. McLean was called out,

but was too unwell to respond.

Hon. John Kerr, as Chairman of the

Committee on nominations, reported the

The following resolution, offered by Hon

John Kerr, was unanimously adopted:

That this Convention, representing the

feelings and wills of the people of this

Congressional District, are duly sensible of

their obligation of gratitude to David P.

Caldwell, Esq., for his earnest devotion to

the interests of our country, and especially

for the ability displayed by him in defense

of the principles of the Democratic Conserva-

tive party in the late canvass for Con-

gress in this District.

In response to this resolution, Mr. Cald-

well came forward and tendered his grate-

ful acknowledgements in a highly patriotic

speech.

Gov. Graham came in and was warmly

clapped and invited to a seat.

The Court House being declared vacant,

the chair announced that the further pro-

ceedings would be conducted from that

place. The house was soon densely packed

and, on being called to order, Mr. Livin-

ston Brown came forward, and in an able

speech accepted the nomination.

It was then unanimously

resolved, That, while we deprecate any

and all violence, and earnestly desire peace

and good order, we will, nevertheless, main-

tain our just rights and the rights of all

who are associated with us in our struggle

for the restoration of civil liberty; and espe-

cially will we support and defend those

generous, brave and grateful colored people

who have united with the Democratic party,

and who stand exposed to the insults and

injuries of Radicals, and who, without our aid,

will be subjected to such coercion as will deprive them of the right of voting as they please.

Gen. J. M. J. Lee, being called on, then

closed the Convention.

It was moved that the Chair notify Mr.

Robins of his election as Elector and re-

quest him to accept and canvas the Dis-

trict.

The following resolutions were unani-

mously adopted:

Resolved, That, Dr. P. F. Duffy, Esq., has won

our admiration and entitled himself to our

thanks by his brilliant efforts in the cause

of civil liberty; we hail him as a friend

to the State.
