THE RESULT OF THE ELECTION.

Contrary to our expectations, the triumph which came to hand after midnight, on the night of the election, rendered the result in the entire country certain. Grant and Colfax are certainly elected President and Vice President of the United States, for the next four years.

However gratified this may be to the feelings of the Southern people, it is palpable that the power they adjust themselves to the necessities of the case and the inevitable logic of events, the better it is for the people.

Our Radical opponents have indulged in high-drawn promises and anticipations of the future under Radical rule.
